In Loving Memory of Cathie Nichols

1951-2020 by Jan Gammon

Cathie Nichols, a member of the Lincoln Highway Association since 2005, served as the Clinton County Consul after she retired from the nursing profession in 2015. From July 2018 to April 2019, she served as the president of the Iowa chapter of the Lincoln Highway Association. She had a passion for history and the Lincoln Highway. Helping at the LHA's National Conference in Denison, Iowa in 2017 she sported red-white-and-blue toenails complete with the Lincoln Highway "L" painted on both big toes.

Cathie also loved her 1964 Ford Galaxie and drove it in LHA Motor Tours and often to chapter meetings. The Wapsi bridges were a passionate project for her as she met with property owners, the Clinton County engineer, and local historical andcivic groups. She had a can-do attitude and never shied away from a project or a challenge.

In April 2019, she was given a stage I pancreatic cancer diagnosis and resigned as lowa president, with the plan to return in one year. She met this cancer challenge head-on, maintaining a positive attitude. After surgery, the diagnosis got bumped to stage III. Unwavering, she endured chemotherapy and its side effects.

Cathie attended the Iowa ILHA meeting in October 2019. But in 2020 she and her husband, Norm, were in a car accident that totaled the beloved Galaxie. We thought things were on the mend for both, but learned that Cathie passed away in a hospice house in Bettendorf on December 17, 2020.

The entire LHA organization and the Iowa Chapter will miss her bright smile, leadership, and positivity. Our sympathies go to Cathie's husband, Norm, her daughters and extended family.

President's Corner (cont.)

- The Iowa Scenic Byway Passport program kicked off early January. As of January 25, there were over 2,000 travelers signed up with 430 check-ins in 100 locations. I am hopeful this initial interest will translate to increased travelers along the Lincoln Highway during our peak "season" (which is June August).
- Tourism is a proven economic driver for Iowa, generating over \$9 billion in 2019.
- Did you know, in 2019 travelers spent an estimated \$25.38 million a day in Iowa! Our tourism budget ranks 42nd in the Nation.
- A "traveling party" spends an average of \$401.31 daily in Iowa. This breaks down to:
 - Entertainment 17%
 - Lodging 32%
 - Transportation 16%
 - Food 18%
 - Shopping 17%
- Day trips showed a slight increase in 2020 from 2019 with rural travelers from 42.2% to 46.7%. With overnight trips jumping from 39.1% to 49.3%. These statistics are promising for 2021, speculating lowans will continue to take day trips.

Each of us know Iowa has so much to offer tourists. I'm not saying promoting Iowa, our communities, the Lincoln Highway and other local attractions solely falls on our shoulders but we need to do our part. I'm certainly not satisfied with being 42nd in the nation for tourism. We have room for growth. 2021 is the year for us to heavily promote the Lincoln Highway along with our communities and other local attractions.

I realize we don't have the budget for large scale marketing so how do we promote and get involved? I know there are social media avenues where we can promote. Hopefully COVID will be (somewhat) under control and social distancing will be lifted so we can participate in community events so we have a presence, but are there other ways we can promote and get involved?

As I began mentioning October 2020, our Association needs to plan for our future and I believe 2021 can be an important year for us. We have great opportunities to increase awareness of the Lincoln Highway with the Iowa Scenic Byway Passport program but there are other areas we need to concentrate on. As a reminder, here are some of the things for consideration as an Association (yes, these are repeated from my Winter column):

- We have decreasing membership and declining bank account how do we increase those? How do we engage our membership to become involved?
- How do we capture our historians' knowledge? This concerns me since we've lost a number of historians recently Bob Owens and Dick Shild to name a couple.
- How do we build a strong cornerstone for the Association?
- How do we recruit for membership individuals, businesses?
- How do we get our communities to become active in the Association?

We as an Association need to come together to address our future in 2021 and beyond.Let's make 2021 great! Thank you for your continued commitment to the Lincoln Highway - Past, Present and Future.



Let's Celebrate! Now a National Scenic Byway!

We are now a National Scenic Byway! The Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) long-awaited announcement came the morning of February 16, 2021. Iowa's Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway now joins Nebraska's Lincoln Highway Scenic and Historic Byway (also newly designated) and the previously designated Illinois Lincoln Highway Byway to make over 1,000 miles of continuous National Scenic Byways covering 3 states.

The routes in Indiana, Ohio, and parts of Pennsylvania are currently state byways. The routes in New York, New Jersey, West Virginia, Wyoming, Utah, Nevada, and California are not recognized by their Department of Transportation as a byway, but maybe someday?

From the FHWA announcement: "In 2020, 63 nomination applications were submitted. Forty-nine byways in 28 states were designated, including 34 National Scenic Byways and 15 All-American Roads. This determination takes into account evidence of intrinsic quality(s); demonstration of national or regional significance; overall visitor's experience; and demonstration of long-term sustainability.

All newly designated byways will be featured in a commemorative 2021 National Scenic Byways Program Designations Booklet, and will be added to the America's Byways website. For a list of the All-American Roads and National Scenic Byways designated in 2021, please view the 2021 Summary of Designated Byways."

So along with this announcement came a flurry of spreading the word through press releases, social media posts, as well as answering well-wish messages from fellow lowans, fellow lowa Byways, and people from across the nation.

Word seemed to spread quickly! We thank you for all of the support the Lincoln Highway Association and the Iowa chapter have given the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway over the years.

Cedar County Report


This past fall, the Highway 30 Coalition (4 lane advocates) asked Cedar County Board of Supervisors to contribute \$150 (or \$175) a month to the coalition for "support." The board turned them down.


In January, it was reported the IDOT opted for a Super-2 design from Mt. Vernon to Mechanicsville. (Nothing was reported beyond Mechanicsville although it could have been missed by those reporting.) That choice apparently comes down to expedient economy. Easements and purchases, they cited a four-lane requires 478 acres through this corridor; where Super-2 only needs 120 acres.

In reaction to the Super-2 decision the Highway 30 Coalition responded by saying, "if the state will not consider some version of a four-lane" (my way) then "leave it alone." Their opinion is a Super-2 does nothing to improve traffic flow through the county.

Clarence City Council now favors by-passing rather than going through downtown. The city believes if people want to drive to Clarence, they will make the effort. It's not in the best interest to bisect Clarence main street businesses by taking away downtown parking to accommodate faster traffic while risking pedestrian street-crossing incidents.

No timeline was reported.

Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Update:

The Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway is excited to be a National Scenic Byway and looks forward to the future (see page four).

We are in the midst of a passport program with Travel Iowa. The program rolled out January 5th, which is not typically a travel-heavy month. In the first month, nearly 2600 people signed up for the program and checked in 706 times at 125 different sites along the 13 participating Byways in Iowa. Since the initial location sign-up we have added Reed-Niland Corner and will be adding Mahanay Bell Tower, Grand Junction ILHA Museum and Garden, and Nevada's Lincoln and Jefferson Highways Heritage Park.

Each Byway is to offer a prize basket for one lucky winner to win each month. Our month is April and our prize package so far includes a 2 for 1 night stay at Mitzi's Place in Woodbine, a bottle of wine, 4-pack of Alluvial beer, Iowa roasted coffee from Marion, 2 admissions to the Sawmill Museum, \$50 in Clarence Bucks, and an assortment of smaller prizes including koozies, bottle openers, insulated bag, and pens. We are trying to add to the package daily, so if your business wants to donate something, let Jan Gammon know.

We are also working on redesigning the Info Guide we created back in 2016. It will be reorganized by community rather than by intrinsic quality. We received a grant from Iowa Tourism and will be selling ads for the cash match to the project. If you have a business or know of a business that would like to advertise in the brochure, just let Jan Gammon (jgammon@prrcd.org) or Mike Kellner (mkellner@prrcd.org) know.

Our largest current project is the 10 interpretive panels we started under a generous grant from the Union Pacific Railroad. We have 2 completed- one for Preston's Station in Belle Plaine and one for the M and M Divide near Arcadia. Those are waiting for spring and will host unveiling ceremonies after installation. We are currently working on ones for the Bowstring Bridge in Yellow Smoke Park, the Eureka Bridge near Jefferson, Woodbine's brick street, and Marshall County's courthouse.

We are awaiting word on a grant from the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) to see if we receive funding as a match for the 4 panels in Clinton. If the DAR funding comes through, we are anticipating adding panels in Ames and Vail to the overall project. Each panel will have an unveiling ceremony after installation.





Preston Station's Unveiling

Tourists driving through Belle Plaine along the Iowa Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway[™] - A National Scenic Byway can discover a treasured legacy, which has stood for more than four generations. On Saturday, May 1, Preston's Station Historic District unveiled an interpretive panel sharing its history.

Prairie Rivers of Iowa Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway program facilitated the interpretive panel's design and construction as part of a ten-panel project using grant funding from the Union Pacific Railroad Community Ties Giving Program and Humanities of Iowa along with a cash match courtesy of the Burke Heritage Fund. These interpretive panels offer travelers and their families a safe, fun, educational and engaging activity.

"We are honored to be one of the sites to have been selected to install an interpretive panel," says Preston's Station Historic District owner Mary Helen Preston. "Our panel showcases four generations of Prestons which began in 1913 when my great grandfather followed the railroad for work to Belle Plaine. As the Lincoln Highway was rerouted through Belle Plaine, George W. (not the George who made Belle Plaine famous) saw an opportunity to provide a needed service to Belle Plaine and travelers along the Lincoln Highway."

From great-grandfather to grandfather, to father, to daughter, the family has remained Preston Station's caretakers preserving the property and telling the story of how important, the railroad and the Lincoln Highway have been to Belle Plaine.

Niland Café in Colo Reopens!

Niland Café in Colo reopened May 14 to a huge crowd, keeping staff busy all day and through the weekend. Danny and Abi Wilson, long-time Colo residents, are the new managers and lease the site from Colo Development Group. The café closed in August 2020 due to Covid-19. The Wilsons have spent months renovating the café. Probably most noticeable will be the relocation of the Cadillac to the nearby gas station museum. With this change, the dining room has more than doubled the available seating. Food is also available to-go and a new ice cream pick-up window has been added. The menu is starting out small offering burgers, tenderloins, roast beef, pulled pork, mashed potatoes and gravy, side dishes, pie, shakes and ice cream.



Café hours are Friday 11AM-7PM, Saturday 7AM-7PM, and Sunday 7AM-2PM.

The motel has 6 rooms for rent and has seen upgrades of new paint, blinds, and bedding. They rent for \$60 per night and include a mini-fridge, Wi-Fi, and cable TV.

Reed-Niland corner is an important Lincoln Highway site. In 1923, farmer Charlie Reed began selling gas, then added food and lodging. Other Niland family members were involved in the operation, thus the name Reed-Niland. Three generations operated the site for over 70 years. At one time, it was a stop for both the Greyhound and Jefferson bus lines. The café was open 24/7 to accommodate travelers with the gas station also open. The Jefferson Highway intersects with the Lincoln Highway here and conjoins with it as the routes travel west to Nevada and Ames.

In 2003, the Colo Development Group purchased the site and restored the café. The motel units opened in 2008. Over the years, several individuals have leased and managed the café for the Colo Development Group. The Wilsons are taking advantage of their local connections and the recently organized Colo Historical Society will help with some of the displays. The Wilson's have 5 children aged 2-18 years old in the Colo-NESCO school district where Abi is completing her 9th year as a teacher. She will now concentrate on operating the café and motel. Danny grew up in Colo and worked for his father on his farm and auction house. Currently, Danny has his own carpentry business and works for the City of Colo.

Short and Sweet with Shani

On your next trip across the Lincoln Highway in Western Iowa, make a stop to reflect and honor our veterans at the Eugene Kock Memorial Park in Westside, IA. The memorial honors **U.S. Army Specialist/4 Eugene Kock**, a local soldier who died in Vietnam on March 22, 1969 at the age of 20 years old.


Located at the corner of Cedar Street and the Lincoln Highway, the memorial and park features a bronze sculpture of a battle-field cross, which is made with a soldier's rifle stuck into the ground between a pair of combat boots, with the soldier's helmet on top of the rifle. The battlefield cross is often placed on or near a battlefield to memorialize a fallen soldier.

This battlefield cross also contains a replica of Kock's dog tags, as well as a bronze plaque providing details of Kock's life and death. Behind the cross several flags fly, including the flag of the United States, the flag of Iowa, and the POW/MIA flag. Around the park, you will find 312 engraved pavers, of which 102 are memorial pavers to honor veterans.

Seventeen pavers at the center of the park honor soldiers killed in action in World War I and World War II.

The park was dedicated on Memorial Day, 2018.

While in town, stop by the Westside Tap for food or a beverage. Located on Main Street, Westside Tap opens at 5pm Tuesday-Saturday and serves food from 5:30-8:30pm on Tuesday-Wednesday and 5:30-9:30pm on Thursday-Saturday.







Welcome VP Dale Higgins

Since Dale was elected vice president of the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association he never has really been introduced to the membership. So let us do that. We have known Dale for a number of years, but have gotten better acquainted through some of our work sessions and meetings in Grand Junction. He was always in the East Greene school district, while our family was just over the line in the Jefferson district.


Originally the Higgins clan came to the United States from England and settled south of Chicago near the towns of Wilmington and Braidwood. They settled near what is now Route 66. Great Great Great Grandfather is buried in a cemetery only a stones throw from the now famous byway. Some of the clan is still there; however, Dale's strain moved to lowa. The Higginses opened the first coal mine in Illinois. The property along with the inactive coal mine are still owned by the family who stayed in Illinois. Dale still has artifacts and fossils from the mine. He visits back there regularly. Dale was born in the Greene County hospital in Jefferson in 1952 and eventually was part of a farm family of 8 children. They never got into town very often, but part of Dale's interest in history began on those visits to Grand Junction. In the 50's it was a thriving and active farming and railroad center. Dale remembers 5 grocery stores, 2 theaters, several hardware stores, 2 banks, and 3 auto dealerships. There were 2 farm implement dealers and 19 places to buy gas. The Lincoln Highway was busy with 3500 cars and 700 trucks passing down mainstreet daily. Dale went to school in all three East Greene Schools and just barely missed out on a murder on the steps of the Dana School. The murderer was found guilty but hung himself while in jail.


Dale served two years in the service after graduation and then worked for the school as a mechanic. He then opened his own mechanics shop on Main Street. By this time U.S 30 had been moved north of town. In 1992, at the urging of some of his customers, Dale attended an auctioneering school at Mankato, Minnesota. He is still in that business today.

Through the years, Dale has collected tons of stuff dealing with the Lincoln Highway, Grand Junction, Greene County, and beyond. Some of his prized items include 4 display cases of Lincoln Highway items, which I hope will be on display at a future meeting in Jefferson. He also has one of the best corn and hybrid corn displays in Iowa. The display is centered around the Turner Hybrid company, which was in Grand Junction. Turner was the man who taught Henry Wallace about hybrid breeding. Wallace later started the Pioneer hybrid company.

We hope to see a good crowd in October!

So on that faithful morning, I took a journey to Colo along the Lincoln Highway.


Green Gable Cabins

Lyell Henry, Lincoln Highway Association Founding Member, has written about the Green Gable Cabins and other manufactured cabins for the Society for Commercial Archeology (SCA magazine. In the early 1930's, Green Gable Cabins were built in Onawa, Iowa, following a specific plan. The cabins were prefab and shipped to many locations with the idea of becoming a national camp chain. Green Gable Cabins lasted only a few years in their effort to become a national chain.

This period of time were good years for tourist camp startups along America's highways; as travelers were looking for a step above camping with tents, but below staying in hotels. A selling point for the Green Gable Cabin Camps was the franchise advertising for the camps. At one time, there were 61 Green Gable Cabin Camps advertised. In 1931 the cabins were distributed: 32 in lowa, 16 in Minnesota, seven in South Dakota, five in Nebraska, and one in Illinois. Later in the 30s, 29 more cabins were distributed.

The last Green Gable Cabin Camp was built and opened in 1938 in Carroll, Iowa. Jefferson also had a Green Gable Cabin Camp located two blocks south of the courthouse on Wilson Street. One of these cabins was moved by the late Bob Owens to his backyard in Jefferson some 20 years ago. Before his passing Bob asked that the cabin be relocated at another Lincoln Highway location; so about a year ago, Bob Ausberger, Dale Higgins, and Wayne and Jim Taylor moved the cabin from Bob Owens' backyard to the Quirks Cabin location but due to zoning issues was moved again to the Lincoln Highway Garden in Grand Junction.

Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Tama Bridge

One of the most iconic bridges in the 3,389 mile length of the historic transcontinental Lincoln Highway is in Tama, Iowa; its structural integrity is in need of repair.

The Tama Lincoln Highway bridge holds an important place in the history of transportation in our country. It was constructed in 1915 when Woodrow Wilson was President of the United States and before we got tangled up in World War I. It was the year Babe Ruth hit his first career home run. Half of the US population lived on the farm, and most transportation was still by foot or horse. The Model T was popular and promised increased mobility but roads could be treacherous, especially after a rain. The idea for the first improved transcontinental highway generated support across the country and gave birth to the Lincoln Highway. Towns along the roadway's charted path were grateful for the honor, anticipating an influx of travelers and hence growth in commerce.



Tama's now-famous bridge was constructed to attract interest and burnish the town's image as a destination. Designed by Iowa Highway Commission architect Paul N. Kingsley, the Lincoln Highway Bridge is distinctive for spelling out the name of the roadway in its railings. Concrete lampposts topped by globe lights decorated the bridge's four corners, adding to its graceful charm. The Tama bridge was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1978, nominated by the Tama Bicentennial Commission. The nomination included a quote from the July 1919 Lincoln Highway Forum, asserting that the bridge is "a good example of up-to-date highway advertising. Tourists over this section of the famous road cannot fail to be impressed with the advertising values as well as the pleasing and distinctive appearance of this unique feature of bridge construction."

While the bridge has continued to attract admirers over the years, time has taken its toll. Prairie Rivers of Iowa worked with the City of Tama to assess the integrity and safety of the bridge and put together a plan for its restoration. In 2018, PRI applied for and received a grant from the Historical Resource Development Program of the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs to help cover the costs. Additional support and funding has come from the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association, the Mansfield Foundation, and other donors, but a series of delays and the advent of COVID have held up progress. In October of this year, Iowa DOT informed Tama that Iowa Code necessitates yet another delay to gather additional information and must rebid the work. Meanwhile, the original cost estimate of \$115,000 has mushroomed to over \$300,000.

The Tama-Toledo News Chronicle reported in October, the City of Tama is planning to re-bid the project and complete the repair by August 2022. The situation is being closely monitored by PRI, the lowa Lincoln Highway Association, and history buffs across the nation.




