Building a Byway for the Future: Creating a Corridor Management Plan

Recently, you might have heard that the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway is beginning to develop a Corridor Management Plan, or CMP. This is an exciting opportunity for the Lincoln Highway in Iowa—a chance for all of us to recognize the most important assets of the byway, identify areas we would like to strengthen, and think about how the Lincoln Highway can help build local economies.

What is a CMP?

A CMP is a written plan that defines the assets of a byway and sets out a guide for enhancing them. It covers the byway's historic, scenic, archeological, cultural, natural, and recreational qualities. A CMP includes short- and long-term plans for interpreting key sites, increasing tourism, and economic development. CMPs are based on input from community members like you.

Why is a CMP important?

First, it gives all of us a chance to contribute to planning to reach our goals for the byway. Second, the Iowa Byways program, of which the Lincoln Highway is a part, requires a CMP for each byway in the state. Finally, the Federal Highway Administration requires a CMP for byways hoping to become a National Scenic Byway.

Who is working on the Lincoln Highway's CMP?

ALL supporters of the Lincoln Highway and its communities are invited to get involved. The creation of the document is being managed by Prairie Rivers of Iowa, the nonprofit organization that coordinates the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. Byway Coordinator Angie Hettinger and I are the main staff contacts.

What's next for the CMP process?

The CMP development process is scheduled to last through 2016. Right now, we are building contact lists of potential key people to talk to in Lincoln Highway communities. Later this year, we will begin distributing surveys to collect community input and scheduling public meetings across the state.

How can we learn more?

I encourage anyone interested in the Lincoln Highway to participate in helping to develop the CMP. The first step is to sign up for our mailing list, which we will use to give you updates and let you know of opportunities to get involved. The Ames Shovel Company and the Lincoln Highway

As Joyce and I prepared for our Lincoln Highway presentation to the fifth graders at Kate Mitchell Elementary School in Ames, the issue of the town's namesake, the Ames Brothers, came up. They were especially interested when they found out that we had an antique Ames Shovel.

Ames, Iowa and I suppose Ames, Nebraska and possibly some other towns were named after Oliver and Oakes Ames. Their father, John, had started the Ames Shovel Company in 1774 in the town of West Bridgewater, Massachusetts. In 1803 the company was moved to North Easton, Massachusetts, where it remained and expanded until 1952. Today it exists as the Ames True Temper Company in Camp Hill, Pennsylvania.

In 1844, John transferred the company to Oliver and Oakes and the firm became known as Oliver Ames and Sons. Tools for the Gold Rush in 1849 in California and in Australia in 1855 were needed. This spurt in demand made the brothers wealthy. They entered politics—Oakes became a member of the U. S. House of Representatives and became a member of the Railroad Committee. It was the perfect time to establish their construction company.

During the Civil War, Ames shovels were standard issue for the Union Army. The company made swords and picks used by the Army. Also, their construction company built and repaired railroads used to carry war materials. At this time, during the civil war, Congress and Lincoln were anxious to get the transcontinental railroad construction started. The Union Pacific was struggling and in 1865 had only 12 miles of track laid west of Omaha. Lincoln asked

the Ames Brothers to get the project moving. They then contracted to build the east segment of that famous route. Of course there was some graft and corruption but that is a subject for another time.

After the transcontinental rail route was finished, the Union Pacific constructed a pyramid-shaped monument to honor the Ames Brothers and their railroad achievement. Rail passengers could admire the monument, at the high point of the Railroad, for a few years. The line was moved several miles away and out of sight of the monument but the roadbed remained and was used by wagons, stagecoaches and other road traffic because of its gentle grade and all weather material.

In exploring and locating the route, our Lincoln Highway forefathers could hardly resist this well prepared roadbed, and made a deal with the Union Pacific to use it. Today one can find and drive on this section of the Lincoln Highway. It is accessed at the Summit Rest Area on Interstate 80 east of Laramie, Wyoming. From the monument the drive can continue down a very winding dirt road to Tie Siding, WY, and then continue on to Laramie on the paved Route 287.

One source of purchasing an Ames Shovel today is the A. M. Leonard horticultural tool company.

Kids on the Byway

Kids on the Byway is a program of Prairie Rivers of lowa that offers elementary school students authentic learning experiences that can be found through the abundance of resources and experts along the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. This school year, the program has expanded to a total of three elementary schools: Kate Mitchell Elementary and Meeker Elementary, located in Ames, and North Tama Elementary, located in Traer. Each season, "capstone events" are created based off the students' current unit of study. With the help of related experts, we are able to incorporate environmental education as well as lowa history, agriculture, and natural

resources into a day full of fun learning.

Kate Mitchell's winter capstone event focused on enhancing the students' unit on Westward Movement. The experts for the Kids on the Byway capstone event

were Pam Schwartz from the Boone Historical Society, Mike Wendel from the Boone & Scenic Valley Railroad Museum, and Bob & Joyce Ausberger from the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association. Each of the speakers engaged students in the various aspects of Westward Movement, including transportation during and after the era of Westward Expansion in America.

Bob & Joyce Ausberger introduced topics during their presentation that gave the fifth graders at Kate Mitchell a foundation of what a byway is and the history of the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. A unique addition to the capstone event was a contest that Bob and Joyce started among the students that included prizes such as a Lincoln Highway t-shirt and a Lincoln Highway map pack. The contest was aimed at giving the students a new way of learning and thinking about the Lincoln Highway. For the next week, students worked on projects that they thought represented the Lincoln Highway. They could draw a picture, write a poem, or make another artistic creation relating to the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway.

After collecting the submissions, Magon Liu, Kids on the Byway Coordinator, and Kayla Hasper, Kids on the Byway Assistant, judged the entries to declare winners in each of the two classes. From Mrs. Marten's class, the winners were Trinity Engelhardt and Alexis Wilkinson. From Mrs. Mongar's class, the winners were Karla Torres and Chastity Wilson. The winning projects included two drawings of Lincoln Highway road markers, a song that

showed Lincoln Highway pride, and a clay model of the original Lincoln Highway markers. Each winner was awarded a Lincoln Highway t-shirt donated by the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association.

The students enjoyed this creative way of learning about the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. The Kids on the Byway Program was created to provide authentic learning environments and effective, unique opportunities for students to grasp the concepts that are presented in their studies. The



Iowa DOT Proposes New Bridge

On February 7th, 2014, representatives of the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association were presented with a US 30 bridge replacement concept by the Iowa DOT. Kimball Olson, aesthetic bridge specialist with the DOT's Office of Bridges and Structures, unveiled the bridge's proposed features to a group of enthusiastic ILHA members at the Lincoln Highway Museum in Grand Junction, IA.

The bridge, which will replace the current US 30 bridge over 222nd Street and the Union Pacific Railroad just east of Grand Junction and in close proximity to the Lion's Club Lincoln Highway Interpretive Park, is proposed to include special design features that reflect the heritage of the Lincoln Highway at the site. The most striking feature will be 14-foot-tall Lincoln Highway Marker icons at each corner of the bridge. The markers will include the Lincoln Highway "L", red and blue accents, and large metal "lowa" medallions. The supporting piers of the bridge have been designed to recall the front portico of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, DC.



The Board of Directors of the Lincoln Highway Association approved the initiation of a new recognition program called "The Coast-To-Coast Completion Award" at its Board Meeting on February 13, 2014. The new program provides a means for recognizing individuals who have traveled the entire distance of the Lincoln Highway. A certificate of achievement and a commemorative pin will be issued by the LHA to those who qualify for the award based upon successful processing of the application form designed for this purpose.

Anyone who has traveled the entire route is eligible but are required to fill out the application form. The form is available at **www.lincolnhighwayassoc.org** and must be forwarded to the address indicated on the form for processing. There is no application fee or deadline for submission. As many applications as possible will be completed by the review committee in time to announce the names of recipients during the Annual Conference in Tooele, Utah the week of June 17-21, 2014.

Future applications can be submitted and awards issued at any time during the year but only those applications received by April 30th will be announced at each year's Annual Conference.

Many Lincoln Highway enthusiasts have already completed the coast-to-coast travel. This is a significant achievement which warrants recognition in a special way through this program. The recognition program is also intended to inspire others to consider such an adventure as a way of enriching their Lincoln Highway experience.



The original track was built in the 1890s. After many years of being owned by the Chicago & North Western a section of railroad was purchased by the Boone Railroad Historical Society in 1983. Since then, this historical line has continued to grow.

As the Lincoln Highway winds its way along State Center's paved Main Street, the City's streetscape seems to have been frozen in time, a time when State Center's "Remarkable Row" of historic buildings first witnessed Model Ts, Packards, and Maxwells traveling the "new" Lincoln Highway on its dirt streets of 1913. This Iowa Main Street town of 1,468 located in the geographic center of lowa, has been working hard to recapture their Main Street's early 20th Century charm by preserving the town's century-old buildings for the 21st Century. The community has already saved many of its decaying structures from the wrecking ball and has restored them to their former glory. The State Center Development Association (SCDA) and the City of State Center, along with a large crew of hard-working volunteers, are currently in the process of restoring four more historic buildings, including the Woods Hospital Building and the Benson Building on West Main Street, the Home Oil Gas Station located along the 1931 route of the Lincoln Highway, and the transplanted Centre Station Depot on E Main Street.

The Woods Hospital is a Colonial Revival Style



building built on State Center's Main Street in 1911, shortly before the Lincoln Highway came into existence. The building was originally built as doctors offices and later became a hospital. It

remained a hospital until 1953. In 1955, it became a nursing home. Later it was used as a personal residence, a daycare, and a restaurant. The SCDA purchased the building in 2012, updated and restored it, and recently sold it.

The SCDA recently purchased the Benson Building, located next door to the Woods Hospital. They have replaced the dirt floor basement with a full basement and concrete floor. The roof has been repaired, and the main floor is being replaced. The front of the building will be rebuilt to resemble the original 1895 façade. When the restoration is completed this fall, the building will become a drug store.

The cottage-style Home Oil Gas Station was built in 1932 as a Continental Petroleum DX station. In 1938, it became a Mobil Oil station and remained so until 1968 when

it became a Skelly station. The station closed in the late 1980s. The City of State Center purchased the vacant building in 2006. The town finished restoring the structure this June. The building is

now home to the State Center Police Department.

This railway depot is similar to an 1881 lowa Central Railway Depot, which sat at the west end of State Center's Main Street. In 2012, the depot was moved to State Center's East Main Street from the town

of Zearing, 17 miles northwest of State Center. The SCDA is in the process of restoring the depot, which will become an historic interpretive site. The depot sits across the street

from the Washington Township Country School, which was brought to town and restored in 2003.

State Center has successfully restored a number of Main Street buildings sitting along the historic Lincoln Highway. Now folks are busy searching for the next building to be brought back to its glory from another time.



Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Corridor Management Plan Update

Exciting work is continuing on the new Corridor Management Plan (CMP) for Iowa's Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. As you may recall, a CMP is a long-term plan to protect and preserve a byway's most important assets, and to elevate the marketing and interpretation of the roadway to increase heritage tourism, community support, and local economic development. This is truly an important effort because it allows everyone who supports the Lincoln Highway—LHA members, local residents, historical societies, neighborhood businesses—to contribute to a plan that strengthens the byway and its communities for years to come. A new CMP is also critical because it is required in order to eventually apply for National Scenic Byway status for the Lincoln Highway in Iowa.

Since the last newsletter, many of you have stepped forward and provided us with some early information about the Lincoln Highway in your area. Thank you to all the members who have completed our survey and signed up for our CMP mailing list. If you haven't, please visit our CMP website at www.prrcd.org/cmp and click "sign up to get involved." This is your first of many opportunities to share your unique knowledge of the Lincoln Highway for this project.

Beginning this summer, we will be scheduling numerous meetings with individual stakeholder across the state to beginning developing the Lincoln Highway's long-term plan. These summer meetings will be followed by larger public community meetings in every county across the state later this year. All LHA members will be invited to the public meetings, but don't be surprised if you get a call even earlier to solicit your input.

In April, Angie Hettinger and I had the opportunity to meet with our Midwestern byway colleagues at the Heartland Byways Conference in Manhattan, KS. There, we had the opportunity to meet with folks from Nebraska's Lincoln Highway Scenic & Historic Byway, as well as from many other scenic and historic roads. This conference reaffirmed to us the importance of our work toward strengthening the Lincoln Highway in Iowa. I really encourage you to contact me anytime, but especially to talk about the CMP.

Central Iowa Celebrations along the Lincoln Highway

As you travel the historic Lincoln Highway through Central lowa this summer, we hope you'll slow down and stop to spend some time with the friendly folks in western Marshall County and eastern Story County. There are exciting celebrations and weekly events taking place in State Center and Colo, seven miles apart on the Lincoln Highway. Not only do these two small towns share the Lincoln Highway and the Union Pacific Railroad line, they also share a lot of small town pride and hospitality!

The State Center Development Association is busy preparing for the upcoming season of events. The State Center Farmers Market is already in full swing, having opened for its 14th season on Friday, May 16. The market runs from 5-7 p.m. each Friday evening on West Main Street, aka the Lincoln Highway, and runs through Friday, October 10. The market features homegrown fruits, vegetables, and plants, along with baked goods, crafts and other locally produced merchandise. Each week, the market features a food vendor, free children's activities, and live entertainment.

The folks in Colo also have an outdoor Farmers Market! Their market is held each Thursday evening from 5-7 p.m. at the Reed-Niland Corner, where the Lincoln Highway meets the Jefferson Highway. The Colo market features live entertainment, along with free lemonade and tours of the historic Reed-Niland Gas Station. The vendors offer locally produced fruits, vegetables, baked goods and crafts.

Both communities host annual celebrations during the summer months, as well.

The 56th Annual State Center Rose Festival is set for June 19-22nd. The Rose Queen Pageant and the opening day of the carnival, set up "on" the Lincoln Highway, kick things off on Thursday, June 19th. Friday brings the Rose Queen Coronation in the Municipal Rose Garden and the Backyard BBQ Judging Competition. Saturday starts things off with the Grand Parade at 10:00 a.m., followed by the Third Annual Rose Festival Car Show. The Sixth Annual Rose Festival Criterium (bicycle races) and a street dance and fireworks wrap up the day on Saturday. Sunday, June 22nd, features a Truck & Tractor Pull at the West Marshall High School athletic complex, starting at 1:00 p.m.

June also brings the first of Colo's three Classic Car Roll Ins. They are scheduled to take place from 6-9 p.m. on the fourth Friday of the month at the Reed-Niland Corner (June 27, July 25, and August 22). In celebration of its strategic location at the very crossroads of the historic Lincoln and Jefferson Highways, the city of Colo will be celebrating its Annual Colo Crossroads Festival July 11-13th. This year's theme is "Get Fired Up!" celebrating the centennial of the Colo Fire Department. Friday, July 11th, sees the crowning of the Crossroads' Princess and Prince, Kiddies Pedal Pull and other competitions, with a free movie at dusk. On Saturday, July 12th, the tractor ride launches with breakfast at Niland's Cafe. The Crossroads Parade starts at 10:30 a.m. (kiddie parade at 10:15am) followed by car, firetruck and tractor shows. Special historical photographs and items will be on display at the fire station. A street dance wraps up festivities in the evening. Sunday, July 13th, "Higher Power" performs at the city park at 10:30am. The Colo Truck Pull starts at 1:00 p.m.

Now, all we need is you! We cordially invite you to come and help us celebrate the happy days of summer in small town lowa with shopping, dining, and family entertainment along the historic Lincoln Highway in Central lowa.



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


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Byway Updates



We peered through the windows to see the original floor and ceiling and doors and fireplace. Imagine our surprise when the building's owner showed up and asked if we wanted to go inside! Our stop at the Veteran's Memorial Building was a special treat because it was open just for our group. We went inside to see the Grant Wood stained glass window honoring our veterans. In stained glass standing sixteenfeet tall is a central, super-human figure, which is said

to represent the "Republic." She is wearing a blue mourning veil and in her right hand, she holds the palm branch of peace; in her left, the laurel wreath of victory. Standing below her are six soldiers all ranking Private. They represent the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, the Mexican War, Civil War, Spanish-American

War and the First World War.We had a beautiful view of the window with the afternoon sun shining through. Our own Van Becker shared information followed by a brief presentation by a U.S. Coast Guard veteran, who was our host for the visit.We looked through the museum exhibit

and headed to end our day together at supper with good food, door prizes and visiting.

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

The only existing Marsh Rainbow Arch Bridge on the Lincoln Highway in Iowa is on the 3rd of 4 Lincoln Highway routes in western Boone and Greene county. (From Ogden to Grand Junction, crossing Beaver Creek)

James Barney Marsh (JB Marsh) 1854 or 1856 - 1936

Marsh was born in North Lake, Wisconsin. He came to lowa in 1877 and enrolled at lowa State College of Agricultural and Mechanical Arts in Ames. He graduated with a degree in mechanical engineering in 1882. James spent most of his life in Des Moines working in various situations as a bridge builder, salesman, contracting agent, designer, and inventor. He is best known for design and patents on the Rainbow Arch Bridge. He also worked with iron and steel bridges and reinforced concrete underneath arch bridges. Most notable are the underneath arch bridges in Des Moines and Cedar Rapids. His company, the Marsh Bridge Company, went bankrupt in 1909 and was renamed as the Marsh Engineering Co.

Corridor Management Plan Update

Work continues on the development of the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway's new Corridor Management Plan (CMP). As you might recall, a CMP is a major planning document that helps a byway identify its most important assets, ensure that they are protected, and determines a strategy for strengthening the road and telling its story in the future. The Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway's CMP is really important because it is our greatest opportunity to meet with folks from across the state to really discuss what a strong and vibrant Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway would mean to them.

The three-year CMP process has three parts: project planning, meetings and resource analysis, and document development and writing. Over the past few months, we have mostly completed the planning portion and are moving into the meetings and resource analysis phase. We have begun small group meetings in the Lincoln Highway counties, including in Clinton, Tama, Greene, Harrison, and other counties, and more will be scheduled soon. These meetings have included local government officials, members of the media, chambers of commerce and visitors' bureau staff, and even some LHA members. Following these smaller meetings, we will be scheduling large public gatherings to envision the future of the Byway at the community level. All LHA members will be encouraged to attend their local meeting.

At the same time as these meetings, we will also be managing an analysis of the Byway's intrinsic qualities. In the byway field, intrinsic qualities are the historical, natural, cultural, archeological, recreational, and scenic characteristics of a road that set it apart from other roads. Understanding all of these aspects of the Lincoln Highway, especially but not only its history, will help us tell its whole story in lowa.

Home Oil Gas Station Reincarnated as Police Station

The State Center Police Department has a new home in an old landmark still sitting on its original site along the 1931 to 1963 route of Iowa's historic Lincoln Highway. Police Chief Jeff Bunn and his officers have moved into their new headquarters in what was once the Home Oil Gas Station on Old Highway 30, now known as 4th Street SE, on the south side of State Center.

The Diamond Petroleum D-X Company built the station in 1932. In January of 1934, Mayo Coleville and Ray Wilkening of the newly reorganized Home Oil Corporation acquired the business. The Home Oil Company began selling Mobil gas and Mobilgas products in 1938. The wood frame structure, built in a Cottage Style architectural design, has always sported its red brick and white stucco façade.

Another large project that was accomplished this summer was an inventory of all of the byway signs along the road. We documented a total of 1153 signs, with 90% of the signs being in the correct location and in good shape. This took multiple days to complete, but this is something that has not been done since the signs were installed in 2010! After 4 years, the signs are in great shape and I will be working with local agencies throughout the state to get the missing or damaged signs replaced.







Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Updates

With 2014 in the rearview mirror and 2015 in the headlights, now is a good time to take a look back at the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway's progress over the last year. 2014 saw a deepening of the byway's role in the state. We launched an exciting new project, the development of a new Corridor Management Plan for the byway, last year. This plan is an important opportunity for the byway to reach out to residents, businesses, and travelers to create a strong strategy to support lowa's communities along the Lincoln Highway and preserve the important resources of the byway.

Also in 2014, we moved forward with a unique project to identify locations along the byway with sustainable land management practices, thanks to a USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service Conservation Innovation Grant. This project will allow us to build interpretive signage to highlight these land practices, sharing with byway travelers we know are highly interested in a healthy environment.

There are many exciting developments on the horizon for 2015. We'll be pilot testing a new initiative, "Greening the Lincoln," which will recognize and highlight businesses that support the byway and engage in sustainable environmental practices. Be on the lookout for more information on this initiative. In 2015, our Corridor Management Plan project will move into a public meeting phase, with gatherings to be scheduled across the state to meet with residents, business owners, and others about the possibilities for the byway in the future...




Obviously, this station has been abandoned for years. Where in Iowa is this located? That is the question.

Archaeology of the Lincoln Highway Area

While we are normally most interested in the history of lowa related to the development and use of the Lincoln Highway, this issue we will take an even deeper look back in time. Abby Lundquist is a student at lowa State University working as office assistant with Prairie Rivers of lowa. She is researching the archaeology of the Lincoln Highway corridor as part of the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway's Corridor Management Plan process. Here is a brief review of some of her findings:

Archaeology is one of six intrinsic qualities (the others are the historic, natural, cultural, recreational, and scenic characteristics) that are examined in a corridor management plan and it is an important one to consider for lowa because its rich archaeological past helps to reveal the history of the land and the people who have called this area home for thousands of years. Through a working partnership with the Office of the State Archaeologist and the lowa Archaeological Society, we have gained insight into lowa's many archaeological treasures.

Some of Iowa's earliest known inhabitants appeared approximately 11,500 years ago, at the end of the last Ice Age, in what is known as the Paleo-Indian Period. One famous Iowa archaeological site that has been dated to this era is the Rummells-Maske cache in Cedar County. When excavated, it was found to contain spear points representative of one version of the Clovis point, which is the oldest currently known type in North America.

The story of Iowa's people continues as we move through time to the Late Woodland Period, around 1,500 years ago, and to the M.A.D. site in Crawford County where the oldest tobacco seeds from the state have been found. This tobacco was cultivated

by male members of tribes and both the flowers and leaves were dried, ground, and smoked as a part of rituals, or for medicinal purposes.




Figure 3: Nicotiana Rustica Seed

One thousand years ago, the loess hills in Harrison and Pottawattamie Counties were home to people of the Glenwood culture, famous for their earth lodges. These earth lodges and the beautiful rolling hills they are nestled in can be explored at the Loess Hills Archaeological Interpretative Center where history, archaeology, and nature come together in a seamless blend.

lowa's archaeological past and the Lincoln Highway are intimately connected as people both past and present have lived, worked, and traveled through the central regions of this Midwest state. This connection serves as a reminder to us all that the Lincoln Highway and the land it moves through are deserving of both respect and protection.

Old Building Gets New Life Along Lincoln Highway

The Benson Building, sitting at 108 West Main Street in State Center, is the latest renovation project of the State Center Development Association. The 120-year-old structure sits along the Remarkable Row of historic buildings on State Center's West Main Street, which is also the historic Lincoln Highway. The building that sits east, Watson's Grocery Store, is a sister building to the Benson Building. The buildings were built at the same time by the Watson and Tummel families.

Fredrick Tummel had operated a clothing and dry goods store, called the Clothing Emporium, in State Center during the late 1870s. His daughter, Pauline Tummel, came to State Center to join her widowed father and married a local grocer, William Watson, Sr., on April 28, 1880.

There were two devastating fires on State Center's West Main Street in 1895. The wooden Bishop Building, which today houses the YOLO Boutique on West Main Street, was the only structure to survive the January 1895 fire that claimed the west end of the block. That same year, a second fire took out the eastern half of the block, which now left nothing standing but the lone Bishop Building on the far west end of the block.

Later that same year, William Watson, Sr., rebuilt Watson's Grocery Store while, next door, the Tummel family built a sister building to house their clothing and dry goods store. These two new structures helped fill in the burned out block of buildings on State Center's West Main Street. William Watson and J.W. Tummel were in business, next door to one another, in 1922, when State Center's Main Street became part of the historic Lincoln Highway, the first transcontinental highway running east and west across the United States.

In 1924, Elmer Benson bought out J.W.Tummel's store,

and the business became Benson Dry Goods Store. Elmer continued in the dry goods business in this same location until 1956, when he retired from the clothing and dry goods business at the ripe old age of 90. Elmer Benson had been in business in State Center for 71 years.

In 1956, Elmer sold the business to Gladys Smith, and the business was renamed Gladys's. The business continued to change hands until 1987, when the building was sold to Merle Nolta. For the first time in 92 years, the building no longer housed a clothing and dry goods store; it was now a pottery and greenware shop.

In 2013, the State Center Development Association purchased the building. Since then, the SCDA has replaced the roof and restored the building's façade with detail like that of the original. The inside of the structure has been updated with new wiring, plumbing, ceiling, hardwood floors and a deepened basement with concrete floor.

The Benson Building is now good to go for another 120 years, still sitting there beside its sister building along the historic Lincoln Highway. The old Benson Building will soon become the new home of NuCara Pharmacy in January of 2015.

The Beginning of the End

The first time I looked at this photo it didn't register what was happening here. The location is what struck me at first. If you stand in the middle of the yard between the house I grew up in and the old farmhouse my grandparents lived in and look southeast across the road, that's the view here.

Cliff Rhodes is driving his new tractor to his farm located west of the Monthei farm, on the Lincoln Higway. The draft horses are tied to the back of the wagon. What I find poignant about this photo is the look on the horse's face. If you look carefully you'll see a confused look on the face of the horse on the left. He's not sure what to think about his role in the farming operation from this point forward. When he woke up that morning, he was hitched up to the wagon with his brother, just like any other day, and pulled the wagon into town. His sense of usefulness was completely intact.

Upon arriving at the new farm implement dealer, the horses were unhitched from the wagon and tied to the BACK of the wagon. This must have been a confusing situation for the horses, as they had never FOLLOWED the wagon before. Sort of a "cart before the horse" situation. At first this must have seemed like a relief. Especially since they usually had to strain a little coming up Danger Hill pulling the wagon. It wasn't long before the horses were not being hitched to the plow in the fall and spring anymore. And the horses weren't hitched to the corn wagon anymore, either. It soon became obvious the horses were only being used to pull buggies and small wagons. Shortly after this, they didn't even get to pull the buggies anymore, as the Model T took over that work as well. They began spending more time in the back pasture, grazing on the sweet clover there. I'm not really prepared to speculate on their fate after that but I'm sure it wasn't positive, as farming in those days didn't involve feeding anything that didn't work....

Marsh Arch Bridge Update

The fall lowa Lincoln Highway Association Newsletter contained an article about Marsh Arch Bridges. Jim Ranniger, a former LHA president from Colorado, contacted us in response. He chaired the 2007 LHA Conference in Fort Morgan, Colorado. Jim reminded us that the Marsh Arch Bridge in Fort Morgan was the longest Marsh Arch Bridge (Fort Morgan is located on the original Lincoln Highway Colorado Loop). We agree that their bridge is the longest and still think the Cotter Bridge in Arkansas is the most massive. Now we all need to visit these two impressive bridges!

We ate lunch on the II-span (longest)
Marsh Rainbow Arch Bridge at the Fort Morgan
conference. It is now part of the town's walking and
hiking system. The bridge connected the Colorado
loop with roads on the north side of the Platte River.
One of the desirable features of Marsh Bridges was
that they were expandable - thus the Platte (which
has been described as a mile wide and an inch deep)
needed II arched segments to span while many of
the creeks in lowa would need only one segment.

For the Cotter Bridge, we should have used the term most massive instead of largest as each segment had a higher and thicker arch. It was also made of concrete with a pinkish aggregate so that when the sun struck it at certain angles there was a beautiful pink hue to the structure, while most Marsh bridges had the traditional grayish-white concrete coloring.

...The mechanized age had come to lowa and the beginning of the end of self-sufficient, subsistence farming was well on its way. Since this picture was taken, tractors have continued to get larger and more powerful. It completely changed the concept that one man was only capable of farming a total of 160 acres. Over the following decades, farming continued to become more mechanized. The use of technology (and now bio-technology) has made it possible to farm thousands of acres.

be available. I hope the weather cooperates on Saturday, January 10, and we see you here in State Center, the Rose Capital of Iowa.


