# Trolling Clinton: Sawmill Museum

Danish recycling artist Thomas Dambo will be creating one (or more!) of his iconic troll sculptures at The Sawmill Museum in Clinton.

One installation is to be located on property in the Lyons District belonging to The Sawmill Museum, a local museum preserving Clinton's lumber history. The project aligns with the museum's "Envisioning the Future" initiative to transform its grounds into cultural destinations that connect history, art, and the natural world.

A second installation is to be located at the Bickelhaupt Arboretum, Sawmill Museum Board of Directors president Ari Lewerenz said.

Expected to be completed in the early summer of 2026, the installations will be Dambo's first in both Iowa and along the Mississippi River. Dambo has, otherwise, crafted 130 giant troll sculptures of recycled materials in 17 countries.

"This is more than art, it's about community. This project reflects the creativity, collaboration, and determination that I think define Clinton as a community," Lewerenz said. "Having Thomas Dambo's art here will not only elevate our vision but also create a lasting legacy for residents and visitors to enjoy."

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## Alternative route offers hope for iconic Lincoln Highway Bridge in Tama, Iowa

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A new route through Tama bypasses the more than century-old Lincoln Highway Bridge, offering an opportunity to save the iconic structure.

Built in 1915, the Lincoln Highway Bridge is the last original bridge remaining along the historic transcontinental highway but has fallen into disrepair in recent years. The bridge was closed while city leaders and residents debated its future.

Late last year, the Tama City Council approved a Department of Transportation realignment of Fifth Street to bypass the bridge. The town of just over 3,000 residents is in east-central Iowa.

Prairie Rivers of Iowa noted January 16, 2025, that the new route avoids the historic bridge, and a core team of stakeholders has been assembled to discuss a future resolution for the bridge.

It is official, the City of Tama, Iowa, home of the iconic Lincoln Highway Bridge, has announced they are going forward with an alternate traffic route of 5th Street, thereby avoiding the historic bridge. Construction of the alternate route is to begin in April with work to be done by PK Construction. The route will curve around the bridge on the west and connect with Business 30 to the north. There will no longer be access to the bridge by vehicles.

The now iconic Lincoln Highway Bridge was built in 1915 by architect Paul N. Kingsley, who became world renowned for his design talent. He designed the Tama bridge based on the slab bridge design by the Iowa Highway Commission. Instead of balusters, the decorative railing spells out the words, "Lincoln Highway." It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in March 1978.

The bridge was paid for by the citizens of Tama who were proud that the Lincoln Highway route went through their town and saw the design of the bridge as a way to advertise and distinguish their bridge from hundreds of others across the U.S. Longtime Tama resident, Charles Betz, recently found a photo with additional local advertisements on the bridge railing.

For over 100 years, Lincoln Highway travelers and then enthusiasts from all over the world would drive over the bridge, stop to see it up close, and take photos. They have been known to ship their cars to New York, travel the entire Lincoln Highway route from Times Square to San Francisco, and then ship their cars home.

The Lincoln Highway through Tama is also a farm-to-market road. For many years, residents, farmers, and truckers have traveled the Lincoln Highway through the town on this main route. Maintenance has been continuous over the last 100 years and the community continues to take pride in their bridge. Tama-Toledo has adopted the bridge as their identity by using the image in welcome signs on Hwy 30, in their town logo, with a small replica at city hall, and the annual Bridge Festival in May.

The existing bridge can no longer hold the load of vehicular traffic. With the alternate traffic route for 5th Street avoiding the bridge, the future of the concrete bridge continues to be hopeful.

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As you travel along the Lincoln Highway be sure to stop in Grand Junction to visit the Museum, Lincoln Highway Garden and the Green Gable Cabin.


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


# Lincoln Highway Included in Rand McNally Road Atlas

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



Next the devastating news...


The middle pump from in front of the Café was stolen TWO days after Memorial Day, just prior to opening for the season.

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

# 13 Iconic Stops Along Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway

Piggybacking on Iowa PBS's Road Trip Iowa trekking across Iowa, I came across this article on *Iowa Starting Line* by Katie Giorgio. Some of the sites mentioned are not so familiar stops. Why not get out to explore this summer.

Read on to learn about some of the iconic stops you can make as you travel the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway (seen here as you travel east to west, but feel free to chart your own course), Iowa's portion of this famed strength of pavement. To plan your full trip, check out the [Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Activity Guide](#).

## 1. Mississippi River Eco Tourism Center - 3942 291st St., Camanche

Travelers heading west on the Lincoln Highway first cross the Mississippi River at Clinton. Not too far away in Camanche, you can stop and visit the Mississippi River Eco Tourism Center to learn more about the mighty river that makes its way through the heart of the country. There is an 8,000-gallon fish tank where you can see some of the native habitants of the Mississippi. You can rent canoes and kayaks to explore the surrounding waters or take guided boat tour during the summer months. There is also a nearby campground and marina.

## 2. Abbe Creek School Museum - 877 W Mount Vernon Rd., Mount Vernon

Built in 1856, this small, one-room schoolhouse had to be moved slightly to accommodate the Lincoln Highway being built nearby in 1925. The school operated until 1936 and was a private residence at one point before being dedicated as a museum in 1964. Just behind the school is a small cemetery where many early settlers, including two Civil War veterans, are buried. The earliest gravestone dates back to 1847. The Abbe Creek School Museum is open to the public on Sundays in June, July, and August from 1:00 – 5:00 p.m. in June, July and August.

## 3. Jumbo Well - Corner of 8th Ave. and 8th St., Belle Plaine

Some call it the eighth wonder of the world. It certainly is interesting. Jumbo Well was first discovered in Belle Plaine in 1886. The city was known for sitting on a large artisan well with strong pressure that would push water all the way up to the second story of buildings without pumping. But when the city first decided they needed a well, they put out a bid for someone to drill the well, and it went to the lowest bidder. However, all went awry. They dug a two-foot hole but it blasted water 50 feet into the air at 50,000 gallons per minute. Many people tried to stop it, but all were unsuccessful ... for 14 months! It was eventually stopped but news spread all around the country of this astonishing water wonder. Today, a plaque on a rock at the corner of 8th and 8th marks the spot of Jumbo Well.

## 4. Meskwaki Cultural Center and Museum - 303 Meskwaki Rd., Tama

The land now known as Iowa has long been inhabited by the Meskwaki Tribe who began defending the territory from French settlers in the 1700s. After many decades, on July 13, 1857, the Meskwaki formally purchased their first 80 acres in Tama County. Today, they own some 8,100 acres in Tama, Marshall, and Palo Alto County.

In Tama, the Meskwaki Cultural Center and Museum was built to help spread awareness of the history and cultural significance of the tribe. The museum opened in 2010 to help give visitors a glimpse of the tribe's rich history and culture. It's full of artifacts, including those that have been reacquired and repatriated, that showcase the Meskwaki lifestyle and traditions. You'll see arrowheads, bowls, spoons, other pottery, tools, clothing, jewelry, photographs, and other objects. The museum is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., but other visits can be arranged by calling in advance.

## 5. 1915 Lincoln Highway Bridge - E 5th St., Tama

This pit stop is short and sweet but is a great photo opportunity. Drive right on over to the bridge on East 5th Street in Tama to see one of the iconic Lincoln Highway bridges. Built in 1915, the bridge has "Lincoln Highway" spelled out in concrete on the side panels.

## 6. Taylor's Maid-Rite - 106 S. 3rd. Ave., Marshalltown

If you've never had a Maid-Rite sandwich, then you are in for a treat; this pit stop takes you to one of the first restaurants to serve up the notable Iowa loose meat sandwich. Taylor's Maid-Rite first opened in 1928 and began dishing up their signature finely ground hamburger sandwich served up with pickles, mustard and chopped onions. You can even add ketchup if you'd like. You can still belly right up to the counter, and why not add fries and a milkshake while you're there?

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**7. Jack Trice Stadium - 1732 Jack Trice Way, Ames**

The home of the Iowa State Cyclones football team is worth a stop as you hit the approximate midway point of the Lincoln Highway. This iconic stadium was first built in 1975. It features a real Kentucky bluegrass field and holds 61,500 people, making it the third-largest stadium in the Big 12 Conference. It is also the only Division I FBS stadium named for an African American. Jack Trice was the school's first African-American student-athlete, playing football for the Iowa State Cyclones in 1923. Tragically, Trice sustained and died from injuries in a game played in Minnesota that same season.

**8. Kate Shelley High Bridge - 190th St., Boone**

The Kate Shelley High Bridge, officially named the Boone Viaduct, is the highest U.S. double-track railroad bridge (185 feet high!) and is still in operation today. But it's also notable for an incident that happened more than 140 years earlier.

On July 6, 1881, a devastating storm washed out a part of the tracks leading up to the bridge. Kate Shelley, just 17 years old at the time, risked her life and crawled across the tracks in order to warn incoming trains of the disastrous conditions ahead. She risked her life, crawling on her hands and knees across the bridge at night during a storm, to save the lives of many others and avoid certain disaster.

**9. Mahanay Bell Tower - 100 E. Lincoln Way, Jefferson**

One of the least expected structures as you travel through rural western Iowa is a large bell tower with sweeping views. But right in the heart of Jefferson's town square, you'll find just that. The Mahanay Bell Tower, some 168 feet and two inches tall, was built in 1968. The tower is one of only four carillons in the state of Iowa—this one has 47 bronze bells.

You can take elevator rides to the top of the tower, where there is an observation deck. From there, you can take in the views of five surrounding counties, as well as the rooftop artwork that has been scattered across the buildings in Jefferson. The Bell Tower Festival takes place in Jefferson each summer as well.

**10. Scranton Water Tower - 1211 Main St., Scranton**

Another quirky stop along the Lincoln Highway allows for a fun photo op. The Scranton Water Tower is one of the ten oldest water towers in the country and remains the oldest working water tower in the state of Iowa. It was first built in 1897 and is a steel elevated water tower—you can't miss it. The famed water tower led to the town's motto, "towering above the rest." You can grab a photo to prove it.

**11. Merle Hay Memorial Cemetery Glidden**

This quick pit stop in the small town of Glidden allows you to pay tribute to Merle D. Hay, a young boy from Glidden who was the first American soldier killed in the trenches of France during World War I in 1917.

The memorial, near the roadside, was erected by the State of Iowa in 1930 in Hay's honor and features a drawing by famed Iowa newspaper cartoonist Ding Darling.

**12. Donna Reed Museum - 1305 Broadway, Denison**

Donna Reed, a beloved actress known for "It's a Wonderful Life," "From Here to Eternity" (for which she won an Oscar), and "The Donna Reed Show," was born and raised in Denison. The Donna Reed Foundation operates the museum and hosts a whole host of performances and workshops to carry on Reed's theatrical legacy. The museum is open on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. or by appointment.

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# Jefferson Matters Wins 2025 Great American Main Street Award

Main Street America announced that Jefferson Matters in Jefferson is one of three recipients of the prestigious Great American Main Street Award (GAMSA), which recognizes Main Street communities for their excellence in preserving and revitalizing their historic downtowns and commercial districts. The 2025 GAMSA honors were presented during the Main Street Now Conference in Philadelphia.

"Jefferson not only embodies the spirit of a thriving Main Street community but also serves as a model of innovation and community engagement for Main Street programs across the state — and the nation," said Debi Durham, director of the Iowa Economic Development Authority (IEDA) and Iowa Finance Authority. Main Street Iowa is a division of IEDA.

Selected by a national jury of industry professionals and local leaders in economic development and historic preservation, Jefferson is being recognized for its welcoming culture and its significant investment in public art programs, which have enhanced the aesthetic value of Jefferson's downtown and brought renewed economic vitality to local businesses.

Downtown rooftop murals have attracted an average of 6,500 visitors each year to the town's bell tower, where they can view the displays from an observation deck. Art-focused efforts have also brought in new businesses and studio spaces; turned unused alleyways into vibrant art hubs; and inspired public art installations and events.

During the past 13 years, community leaders and volunteers led by Jefferson Matters have:

- Transformed \$6 million of public investment into \$18 million of private investment;

- Facilitated the creation of 101 net new jobs;
- Catalyzed the rehabilitation of 115 buildings; and
- Leveraged more than 57,000 volunteer hours.







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# Grand Junction Museum Receives Grant for Inventory Project *From Prairie Rivers*

Prairie Rivers of Iowa received a \$5,000 grant from the Iowa State Historical Society to inventory historical items in the Lincoln Highway Museum in Grand Junction, Iowa.

This project began last spring with the assistance of the Historical Society of Iowa's Field Services Program. Collections professional, Angela Stanford from Advanced Museum Services visited the museum and was able to define a scope and proper methods and procedures to use for completion of an inventory. The grant will allow the inventory to begin and establish a system which can be completed in the future when additional funding is found.



Through the years, Bob and Joyce Ausberger have collected an estimated 1,000 objects related to the Lincoln Highway and highway development in Iowa. In addition to objects and artifacts, the museum, housed in an old bank, features a well-established library of books, postcards, original blueprints, and the archive of a precursor group to the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association.

At the conclusion of the project, the Lincoln Highway Museum will have a comprehensive record of what is in the collection and where the pieces are located within the museum. The inventory document will also be a tool to identify gaps in the collection and to add stories to the artifact entries.

As museums and archives struggle with traditional funding practices to preserve history, we must continue to take the steps necessary to ensure that history is not lost. The Lincoln Highway Museum Inventory is that current step that we are taking to look to the future.

## Reed Niland Corner, Inc. Non-Proft Group Formed

A new non-profit group, the Reed-Niland Corner, Inc., has been formed in Colo, Iowa, with the intent to take over the ownership and management of the Reed-Niland Corner. One member of the organization must be a representative for the Jefferson Highway, one member must represent the Lincoln Highway, one member must represent the Colo Historical Association, and two members must be Colo residents. There are currently 12 members of the organization.

Initial paperwork has been completed and the group is forming committees to fulfill the dedicated purpose to preserve, maintain, and promote the visitor experience of the historic Reed-Niland Corner. And to the continued operation of the café, motel, museum, and apartment buildings through activities which shall include educational programs, advocacy, fundraising, maintenance, and oversight of this historic site. The group hopes to be in a position to take over the ownership of the Corner near the first of the year, 2026.

Background: It has been over 100 years since Charlie sold his first customer gas at the SE corner of his family farm. What began as a supplemental income to farming became a way of life for Charlie Reed, his nephews (the Niland families), and much of the community of Colo. Being located at the crossing of two transcontinental roadways, the Lincoln Highway and the Jefferson Highway, the businesses needed to employ many residents of Colo and the surrounding communities. The Corner became a part of the community.



When Highway 30 was moved to the south and Interstate 35 was built to the west, business declined, and operations ceased by 1995. When the city was gifted the site (minus the apartment building) in 1999 by John Niland, the Lincoln Highway Association and the community of Colo worked together to obtain a succession of grants and donations to restore the buildings and site. By 2003, the station had been restored to an early 1930s design, the café was restored to an appearance it had in 1955, and the motel was restored to a 1946 appearance. The café was leased to operate as a 1950s diner and interpretive center, and the motel rooms were available for rent once again. The Reed-Niland Corner became a popular “one-stop” site to visit on a national level for both the Lincoln Highway Association travelers and the Jefferson Highway Association travelers.

Flash-forward almost 25 years and the Corner is now in a new Era. The community of Colo has invested in a new fire station, a rehabbed firetruck, and a new housing development. Resources are scarce, and insurance premiums are up. At a City Council meeting in February 2025, the council suggested that the city should sell the Corner. Rural Colo resident and Colo Historical Association member, Brenda McGuire, happened to be at the meeting and began asking questions. Brenda contacted Prairie Rivers of Iowa who had recently recorded a video of past Reed Station employees.

Together, Prairie Rivers of Iowa staff, Iowa Lincoln Highway Association members, Jefferson Highway representatives, Kelsey Reed (the current lease holder of Niland’s Café and the Colo Motel), and numerous community members started meeting to discuss options for the Corner.



- It was agreed upon that National Register status and Local Preservation guidelines should be created to protect the property.
- A non-profit should be formed to take over the ownership of the property in order to preserve it and to continue operations

This brings us to many meetings later and back to where we are today.

Prairie Rivers of Iowa Special Projects Coordinator, Shellie Orngaard, is working towards a National Register of Historic Places Nomination for the Reed-Niland Corner District. She is also assisting the City in developing local preservation guidelines.

The Colo Historical Association has been working on grants for awnings for the Reed Station, for which they have recently received awards. The Association has recently posted that they will no longer be located at the station and will not have the station open on the last weekend of the month. Since this is a new development, the Reed-Niland Corner, Inc. has not had a meeting to discuss and cannot comment at this time.



Maintenance issues at the Corner continue to be addressed by the city and the Colo Development Group. A grant committee on the new non-profit is working to find grants to help fund these needs. As with any property management, new maintenance needs arise frequently and communication between groups is key at this time.

Finally, in uplifting news, WHO and "Gabe on the Go" recently filmed a segment at the Corner interviewing former city clerk, Scott Berka and Reed-Niland Corner, Inc President, Brenda McGuire. As Brenda said in the interview, "We hope that the Corner can be a gathering place for years to come."

## Historic Colo cafe to be featured on Business Insider documentary

For just under a century, travelers from across the country have stopped in the small Story County town, Colo.

The town, and specifically one street corner, is known as the "Crossroads of the Nation," marking the point where the national Lincoln and Jefferson highways meet.

And on that street corner is none other than Niland's Cafe.

Decorated with nostalgic checkered flooring and old photographs, it's obvious the cafe's been around for a while — 99 years, to be exact.

Manager Kelsey Reed says cafes like these are a dying breed.

"Fast food has kind of taken over," she said. "People are all about the instant gratification and hurry up and get done and move on to your next spot instead of sitting down and joining in with family and communicating."

But just under a century after first opening its doors, Niland's remains a local favorite.

Cook Jessica McKinney says the menu — which features Iowa favorites like pork tenderloin, among others — has a lot to do with it.

"We've got a building that's been here for 100 years and recipes that people remember going here with their grandparents," McKinney said. "So, it's pretty cool."

But it's not just the memories of Niland's heyday that Reed and her staff are hoping to keep alive. It's the sense of camaraderie — and the lessons that come with it — that they're hoping to bring to the next generation one meal at a time.

# Marshalltown's Queen of Hearts Masion Set for Demolition

The Victorian-style house has been called the Newton Carmean Mansion and the Hatcher Mansion, but is commonly known as the Queen of Hearts Mansion. It got this nickname from its heart-shaped windows.

Built in 1901 for Newton Carmean, president of the Marshalltown Buggy Co., the eclectic-style house featured 18 rooms, including a third-floor ballroom. The house was in the direct path of the 2018 Marshalltown tornado and was further damaged by

the 2020 derecho.

Earlier this year, there was a partial roof collapse near the front porch. As a result, the city condemned the house as a dangerous building and ordered the owners to either demolish or repair it.

"It's long past gone," owner Todd Hollingworth said of the Marshalltown mansion. "It's just collapsing." After exploring grants and other funding sources, Hollingworth said he couldn't come up with the \$1.8 million estimated cost of repair and ultimately decided to demolish it.



West End Architectural Salvage in Des Moines salvaged some interior items recently, followed by the nonprofit Save Cedar Rapids Heritage, whose volunteers salvage as a last resort when a home can't be saved in place or moved.

## State Center Police Department listed on National Register of Historic Places

Congratulation, State Center!

The former Home Oil Service Station, built in 1933 in State Center, is significant for its association with the roadside commercial development of State Center and the final route of the Lincoln Highway/U.S. Highway 30 through town. Originally built as a Mid-Continent Petroleum Company Diamond Service Station, it required approval from neighboring property owners and was designed to harmonize with its residential surroundings, taking the form of a small English cottage with a stucco and brick exterior, faux half-timbering, a steep side-gabled roof, and a nonextant brick chimney. Early amenities included a modern restroom and fireplace, and over time, the building expanded to accommodate growing services: a tank wagon office and “ladies” restroom were added in the early 1940s, and in 1950, a three-bay garage addition ushered the station into the postwar automobile era with offerings like car washing and greasing.

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



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# Greene County Historical Museum Get Murals

Local artist and musician Chad Elliott has spent the last few weeks painting murals on the east and west sides of the Greene County Historical Museum, each referencing a historical aspect of Jefferson.

Elliott was approached by Deb McGinn, Tower View Team chairperson, after receiving a grant from the Grow Greene County Gaming Corporation.

“I knew it was going onto the Historical Society building, and I wanted to make sure it was historically significant,” Elliott said. “But also as an artist, I wanted to do something that I would want to paint, and it being right on Lincoln Highway, I’ve always had an attachment to the highway.”

The Lincoln Highway has also served as inspiration for Elliott in his music, having previously written a song about the road that is directly next to the museum.

His idea to paint a lonely gas attendant from the 50s on the west side became even more relevant to the area when he realized the building right next door used to be a gas station. The color palette is filled with the colors Elliott loves to paint the most, including blues, greens and rusty colors. The first design started in the beginning of the summer, and each mural takes about a week to paint once started.

The east-side mural will have a similar color palette and take inspiration from Norman Rockwell. The piece will depict a family traveling in a retro Chevy and is expected to be completed this month.

“It’s a little more family oriented, and it’ll be like a road trip type of imagery, a family in a car,” Elliott said.



To plan the murals, they were first created on small canvases. The completed works were then copied onto the wall, where weather creates more challenges. Elliott and the mural spent time under a protective tarp during rainstorms before it was completed, and the texture of the surface added difficulty to painting text.

One benefit of painting for an extended period of time for Elliott was getting to talk to people walking around town.

“I love the opportunity to stand there and just work while people walk by talking to me,” Elliott said. “I hear stories while I’m working on it, that’s the best part about doing public art.”

Elliott’s work can be seen on each side of the Historical Museum. His work is also displayed at Elliott Art Studio, located at 113 S Chestnut St. in Jefferson.

## “At the Center of It All” Times-Republican – November 2025

Local artist Eden Petermeier spent months pouring time, talent and love into State Center’s newest mural, on the side of State Center Fitness/Laundromat at 101 E. Main St., owned by Nicole Engel. The State Center Development Association commissioned the project, which was completed November 12.

A mural had previously been located on the building, but after the exterior was repainted over the summer, it provided the opportunity to add a new one.

“We actually had Eden touch up a mural on another building, and she did a great job, we reached out to see if she would like to do (a new mural) for the development group, and asked her for some ideas,” said Association President Jim Eckhardt.

Petermeier’s past mural work includes one at the former Rose Creamery (taken down), a 2018 project in Melbourne (no longer visible), and artistic creations that decorate West Marshall High School’s concession stand. She has no formal art training. After being asked to do the mural back in March, she then came up with three different artistic renderings. The association then voted on which to accept.

“We had a board meeting and decided on this one, to incorporate the things we thought were important for State Center,” Eckhardt said.



The finished piece includes the town’s new slogan: “At the Center of It All.” To Petermeier, this meant making roses front and center of the design, while also working in the school’s colors, water tower and flags (American, state and city), against a dreamy sunset backdrop.

“Those are all roses that are grown in our actual rose garden. I definitely wanted to put a lot of personal effort into creating something that was going to be really personal for the community,” she said.

She added that most of the mural was waist-level or higher to reach, with three windows to work around.

“I knew there was going to be three separate sections — I wanted it to be a scene that flowed together,” she added.

The association gave her creative license to blend and experiment with color. Painting on a metal building had its difficulties.

“It has a lot of grooves and dips into it...the biggest challenge for me was the texture of the wall,” she noted.

She took a break from the project in August to turn her attention to the concession stand mural, while also juggling the duties of being a stay-at-home-mom.

“At that point I was working in the evenings or early mornings before my husband went to work. I can’t give an exact number of hours I worked on it because I stopped keeping track,” she said. “It was not the quickest process of creating a mural. It did take a few months.”




Petermeier is open to taking on additional freelance work and has yet to complete an indoor mural. As long as the work remains enjoyable, she plans to continue her art.

# Byway Carnegie Libraries to Receive \$10,000 Gifts

In October of this year, Carnegie Libraries across the nation received an email alerting them to a gift no one was expecting. The Carnegie Corporation of New York (originally the Carnegie Foundation) stated on their website Carnegie Libraries would each receive a \$10,000 gift to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. To qualify, libraries must have been originally funded by the Andrew Carnegie Foundation, remain operational, and acknowledge their Carnegie heritage. Cedar Rapids, for example, continues to honor its Carnegie connection, even though its Carnegie building is now a part of the Cedar Rapids Museum of Art. Gift recipients may use the funds however they wish to celebrate the 250th anniversary, thereby advancing their mission and benefiting their communities.

Between 1892 and 1917, fifteen Public Carnegie Libraries and one Academic Carnegie Library were located and built along the Lincoln Highway in Iowa. Many of these libraries were built in towns along the Lincoln Highway because they linked communities and gave Carnegie's libraries even greater visibility and accessibility. In western Iowa, a line can connect the dots where a Carnegie Library can be found in Denison, Dunlap, Logan, Woodbine, and Missouri Valley.

In exchange for the free grant to build a library, the communities receiving the grants needed to obtain property, city support, an architect, a builder, and the books to fill their library. It was often women's groups or single librarians who applied for the grants and who were tasked with getting city support for the endeavor.

Of Iowa's 108 Carnegie libraries, 52 are still in use as libraries today, 46 exist but are no longer libraries and 10 no longer exist. Of the Lincoln Highway's 16 libraries built, 7 are still used as libraries: Clinton Public Library, Ames Public Library, Jefferson Iowa Public Library, Norelius Public Library (Denison), Logan Public Library, Woodbine Carnegie Library, and Missouri Valley Public Library.

All Lincoln Highway Carnegie buildings still exist although the remaining 9 outgrew their buildings and built new libraries as opposed to building additions. Carroll, Cedar Rapids, and Council Bluffs are museums, Marion and Dunlap are used by churches, DeWitt is a restaurant (The Old Library), Marshalltown is a government building, Tama is privately owned, and Cornell in Mount Vernon is the Norton Geology Center and Anderson Museum (academic and public shared). Iowa Valley Carnegie libraries include Marengo and Traer, both remain operational as libraries.

Byway Carnegie Libraries who have announced they are accepting the gift include Traer (Iowa Valley), Clinton, Carroll, Logan, and Woodbine. The libraries are asking patrons to share stories about their library and submit photos for possible inclusion on [carnegielibraries.org](http://carnegielibraries.org). The site is part of [Carnegie Libraries Across America](http://Carnegie Libraries Across America), a resource enabling visitors to learn about each building. Iowa has a similar program, [Carnegie Libraries in Iowa Project](http://Carnegie Libraries in Iowa Project). Reach out to your local library to find out how to submit your stories.
