LINCOLN HIGHWAY BYWAY UPDATE By John Mazzello

The Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway is off to an exciting start in 2012! John Mazzello and Peter Hoehnle have been developing a strategic plan to guide our efforts. We have identified four major goals: to ensure a strong administrative capacity for the Byway; to elevate, reveal, and preserve its historic fabric; to ensure the public utilizes and values the Byway as an economic and cultural resource; and to ensure sustainable and diversified funding.

In January, we began a Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Facebook page, and our number of fans is increasing weekly. Our Facebook page is located at www.facebook.com/ LincolnHighwayHeritageByway. have been fortunate to have photographers provide us with dozens of beautiful images (including the LHA's Mike Kelly), many of which we have started sharing on Facebook. To complement these images, and to encourage more people to get outside and enjoy the Lincoln Highway, we are sponsoring a photography contest running between now and September.

This month, we have been interviewing candidates for a summer intern. The internship will focus on marketing the Byway, mapping its resources, looking at methods for using new technologies (such as smartphone apps), and writing about the Byway.



Between The Rivers...and then some! By Jeff LaFollette



The state of Iowa has what we call three "presidential routes". Naturally the main one is our own beloved Lincoln Highway. The Lincoln intersects the other two presidential routes. One route which crosses the Lincoln in Lowden is the Hoover Highway. The Hoover Highway route runs from Lowden to Iowa City and goes through Herbert Hoover's hometown of West Branch.

The highway that we are focusing on in this article is the Jefferson Highway which intersects the Lincoln in Colo. The Jefferson Highway route originated in 1915, and runs from Winnipeg, Manitoba to New Orleans, Louisiana. The route is also called the "Pines to Palms Route". The Jefferson Highway enters lowa from the north and the first community the route enters is Mason City. The route departs lowa into Missouri at Lamoni. The Jefferson mainly follows the route of US 65 through lowa. The Jefferson Highway also rides along with the Lincoln from Colo westward to Ames before the route turns south paralleling US 69 to Ankeny and Des Moines.

Why are we focusing on the Jefferson Highway in this article you may ask? Well the Jefferson Highway has formed an association in 2011, and this year, they are going to conduct their first national conference. The conference will be conducted in Ames on April 27 and 28, 2012. The conference will begin at 8:30 AM at the Gateway Hotel and Conference Center in Ames.

Friday presentations will include: Establishing the Jefferson Highway Route in Iowa, Reed/Niland Corner Restoration & Reopening, Scenic Byways Programs in Iowa and Other States, Building the JHA Archive and Mapping the Jefferson Highway.

Saturday April 28th will be spent "on the road" exploring the northern half of the Jefferson in Iowa The bus trip will include stops at the Iowa-Minnesota border, Historic Park Inn and Rancho Deluxe Z-Garden in Mason City, the Scenic Inn and Princess Café In Iowa Falls, Jefferson Highway Farm near Hubbard, Blattel-Briton Garden in Zearing, and the Reed/Niland corner in Colo.

In addition to the presentations and bus tour, ILHA members will get an opportunity to network with other historic road aficionados from other states and provinces from Louisiana to Manitoba.

The Jefferson Highway Association, like the Lincoln Highway Association lists the majority of its members from Iowa. Their goal is to reach 100 members before the conference. Part of the reason for the strong lowa contingent can be attributed to the strong promotion of the organization by Scott Berka. Scott works for the City of Colo, has helped organize Iowa LHA meetings and motor tour stops at Reed/Niland Corners, and tirelessly promotes the Lincoln and the Jefferson. Scott attends Lincoln Highway meetings regularly. We in the Iowa LHA appreciate all of Scott's efforts. His enthusiasm makes it easy for one to want to become a part of the Jefferson Highway Association. Iowa LHA Noble Sojourner Lyell Henry has also played a large part in getting the group off the ground and running. Lyell has worked hard with the Colo Development Group with the Reed/Niland corner project, and is a natural for helping to get the JHA organization going.

In this issue, we have inserted a registration form for the JHA Conference. With gas prices expected to keep spiraling higher this spring, and summer, this is a great opportunity to explore something new in our own backyard. The full conference fee is \$205. If you can't make the conference this year, then consider joining the JHA. Their dues are \$20 per year and you will receive their quarterly newsletter. Let's help the JHA reach the goal of 100 members by the April 27



start of the conference. To join the association or get more information about the group visit their website which 1 8 www.jeffersonhighway.org. There you can learn more about the JHA and see a map of the entire route, or you can just pan on lowa and follow the route across the state. I'm sure the Lincoln and Jefferson organizations will work well together, especially since the crossroads are here in lowa. L

This more often than not is for the most common result of tear it down and let the wheels of progress move on. I must report that the resistance and reluctance to help in the promotion, preservation and education about the Lincoln Highway needs many more vears of effort. The association has done more than its share of the work in time and money, but it is unfortunate that those in government being paid to preserve history are moving in the opposite direction.

Advocacy is a difficult art form, and the true and effective leader should stand tall in seeking more than possible to achieve the desired results. Sometimes the communities themselves do not see the good in possible outcomes. This may be in the form of protection a property, placing a sign to educate the student or public, to show a route, or highlight the community. The many efforts of the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association in the form of the Annual Buy-Way Sale, the Motor Tour, placement of a kiosk, or the development of a historical property are all significant projects that will reach the results for honoring the Abraham Lincoln Memorial Highway, American's first Main Street across America. Everyone should continue in these efforts as you are best qualified to act. We must continue in the work as presented in our charter and bylaws. I know that you have that energy and dedication, thank you from the bottom of my heart. Look past the failure and focus on the successes that you have achieved and continue in the little steps that you are able to accomplish for the association. Thank you all for your tireless efforts, endless tasks, and sacrifices you have made in this grand effort as we move towards a

a century of the Lincoln Highway. Enjoy, and continue traveling the Lincoln Highway. See you at the meeting in April, and down the road.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS TO TAKE PLACE AT **IOWA LHA MEETING**



We also visited the History Center in Morrison which features a Lincoln Highway exhibit, and concluded the day by visiting the Dutch windmill & interpretive center in Fulton before ending the day with an overnight stay in Clinton.

The tour continued on Saturday from Clinton to Cedar Rapids with stops in DeWitt, the Calamus Pony Truss Bridge, Lowden, Stanwood and Mount Vernon. The skies greeted us with some rain on Sunday but the tour continued from Cedar Rapids to Youngville, Belle Plaine, Tama and winding up in Colo at Reed/Niland Corners.

Again, several states were represented this year, including Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska. The farthest participant came from Massachusetts. This is the third year in a row that the eastern seaboard states were represented (Georgia & Maryland in the past two years). 10 newcomers participated this year as well.

The two state concept was a good idea as it opened up new ground and sites to discover along the Lincoln Highway. In 2013, the 6th annual motor tour will begin in Nebraska and will spend one and possibly two days in the Cornhusker State. Some people have asked if we plan to do a motor tour next year because of the National LHA cross country motor tour that will feature a tour starting in New York and one starting in San Francisco, and winding up at

the site of the 2013 LHA conference in Kearney, Nebraska. The answer is yes. Because our motor tour is a special tour and has a special group that gathers together every year. It has the feel of a family reunion, as we all get together and drive the highway, stopping at the various communities. The towns and town folk greet us like old friends. Even at the new stops we are greeted like we have been visiting for years. That seemed evident to me in Rock Falls this year which was our Friday lunch stop. The people there were excited about our tour coming to town, they placed a great story in their newspaper, many local folks came to see the cars, and they said if we plan to do the Illinois section again, they definitely wish to be part of a future tour. And the group got together for two dinners instead of just the main one in Cedar Rapids at the Hotel at Kirkwood. We had a nice dinner that 48 people attended in Clinton at Rastrelli's. The dinners were a great opportunity to catch up on the day's events and build on friendships made on the tours past and present.

Now, lets peek ahead to 2013. Yes I stated that we will start the tour. In Nebraska, and I'm leaning to two days in Nebraska with the final day ending either in Carroll or Boone. I have some great people who are helping with the planning for next year. Jim & Wini Morris of Papillion, Nebraska who have been on the tour the past three years, and former lowa LHA president Kathy Dirks and her husband Joel are helping out as well. They have volunteered to help this eastern lowa guy save time and fuel by getting the far western contacts set up. Of course, I'll still make the trip to map out the route. I hope to have some help from the Nebraska LHA folks too. I know they will be extremely busy over the next several months planning their big party in Kearney, but I'm sure they can devote a little time to help us out. We will do our best to make next year's tour as enjoyable as the last five have been.

Also I have been given some ideas for future tours. This was a concept early on by Van Becker but is has been echoed by others as well and for year seven I



MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS Iowa Lincoln Highway Association Community Center, Colo, Iowa July 14, 2012 Submitted by Jeff Benson

County Consuls and Officers Attendance:

President – Allan Richards (also representing Tama County), Co-Vice Presidents – Dean & Jeannie Parr Secretary – Jeff Benson (also representing Story County), Cedar County – Joe Goodlove, Linn County – Van Becker, Benton County – Mike Kelly, Greene County-Bob Owens

8 others also attended, including from the RC&D Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway project, John Mazzello, coordinator, Peter Hoehnle, and Jessica Johnson.

President Allan Richards called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. The National Lincoln Highway Association's Friend of the Highway for the restoration of Reed/Niland's Corner was presented to the Colo Economic Development Corporation.

The minutes of the April 2012 meeting were approved.

<u>Ireasurer's Report (by e-mail from the Treasurer)</u>. Currently the checking account balance is \$23,625.14 of which \$15,080 is for the Greene County Interpretive Site project.

Membership Report: Dean Parr reported that with two new National LHA members and 3 new lowa only LHA members there are now 329 total members. State Director Report: For Jeff LaFollette, Van Becker reported that 156 attended the National LHA Conference in Canton, Ohio. The National LHA Endowment Action Fund has awarded a grant of \$2500 for the Youngville Station's new summer kitchen. Van also reported that the Lincoln Highway is now marked on Google Maps.

<u>Website:</u> John Mazzello will be meeting with a volunteer who will be working on both the ILHA and Heritage Byway web sites. Everyone was reminded of the opportunity and need to provide content for the web site.

Items for Discussion:

Lincoln Highway Buyway Yard Sale: Discussed issues of how to register and how to publicize the sale locations. Mike Kelly will see if last year's registration can be located, updated, and placed on the web site so that people can register sale locations with Sandii and Deb so that sales can be listed on the web site.

ILHA Motor Tour had 37 vehicles registered so far.

<u>Greene County Interpretive Site</u>: Jeff Benson on what is completed and what is still in process. Agreed have ribbon cutting celebration at 2 PM after the October meeting in Grand Junction. Joyce Ausber-

ger will coordinate. (The April 2013 meeting will be in Cedar County)

<u>lowa Byways/Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway and Byways of lowa Foundation:</u> John Mazzello thanked the ILHA for the \$500 donation this year and next. He reported that the Byways of lowa Foundation is now registered as a corporation and has non-profit status from the IRS. The fund-raising is getting ramped up; he introduced intern Jessica Johnson who is working on marketing. The new lowa Byways web site is progressing, with a trip planner and travel services.

A REAP Conservation Education Grant has been received for \$27,000. This is being used to develop a "Kids of the Byway" curriculum that will take place both in schools and on the byway. The plans include curriculum for three days in the school and a 4-day summer event, as well as educating teachers. After a pilot project in an Ames school, the package will be provided to other schools. There are opportunities for volunteers knowledgeable about Lincoln Highway history to work with the kids.

In celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Lincoln Highway in 2013, a display is being sponsored at the lowa State Fair, including the LH 100th Anniversary Photography Contest. Other activities include a Facebook site, which has 230 friends, and a brochure being produced in the next few months with Central lowa Tourism. Also a calendar is being considered using Mike Kelly's and Carl Kurtz's photographs, as well as articles in *Iowan* and *Our Iowa* magazines. All present were invited to contact John Mazzello for help with any Lincoln Highway projects.

2013 Convention and Road Tour: A celebration is being planned at the arch in Kearney. The two cross country motor tours already have 200 registered vehicles, in each direction. Two other tours, not sponsored by the LHA are also being planned, one a week before the LHA tour, by classic car clubs, and another by Norwegians, a week after the conference.

Interpretive Display in Cedar Rapids: Van Becker reported that a reproduction of a LH marker is being considered near the flagpole of a new City facility, which put it 200-300 feet from where an original marker was located. He also reported that Dick Thomas of Linn County Historic Preservation Commission is pushing to have an interpretive display about the Lincoln Highway in Cedar Rapids, which not covered by the existing County interpretive kiosks.

New Business: A large sale auction is being planned at the Preston Station in Belle Plaine for August 11. This is much larger that the ILHA was originally told it would be; another sale is being considered for next year. This appears to be a total sell-off of one of the most recognized Lincoln Highway sites. Mike Kelly will try to make a video record of what exists there now, and after the sale. After checking the bylaws, it was determined that (continued on page 5)





Antique cars, Classics, muscle cars, '50s cars, trucks, motorcycles, street rods, and modern cars are welcome to participate. You will travel the original alignments of the Lincoln Highway covering many miles of two-lane history, four-lane progress, and even gravel scenic beauty. Travel from America's urban centers, through pastoral farm lands, over breathtaking mountains and rolling prairies.

Travelers from the East will start at Times Square, the heart of America's most vibrant city. You will travel through ivy-covered college towns such as Princeton, New Jersey, and the Amish country of Pennsylvania. From Pittsburgh's steel and beer brewing industrial history, you will travel through Ohio's diverse agricultural and commercial mix. Indiana takes you through more Amish farm land, South Bend's Notre Dame and automotive history and on to Illinois. From Illinois you will travel to lowa's farmland across the Mississippi River into the prairies of Nebraska and on to the Centennial celebration in Kearney at the Great Platte River Arch Museum. CONNECTING KIDS TO THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY HERITAGE BYWAY

"Kids on the Byway" is an authentic natural resources learning project based on the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway that aims to connect environmental education to the elementary school curriculum. Funded by the DNR's REAP Conservation Education Program and the Alliant Energy Foundation, the project is led by Prairie Rivers of Iowa, which also manages the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. Using resources and locations along the Lincoln Highway, 4th and 5th grade students of Kate Mitchell Elementary School in Ames are given the opportunity to have an authentic natural resources learning experience culminating in three field trips during the 2012-13 school year. Our first field trip on November 30 was based on what the 4th and 5th graders were learning about the concepts of energy and matter. The fourth graders focused on the concept that energy can be transferred and the fifth graders focused on the concept that everything in our world is made of matter or energy. Through the University of Northern lowa, we borrowed mini solar car kits for the students so they could work with solar energy and learn about how it can be used as a source of fuel. The field trip took the students to Iowa State University's PrISUm Solar Car Club Workshop where they saw a life-size solar car and were able to make connections to their own mini solar cars. Students were also able to learn about energy on a whole new level and about energy transfer with ISU's Gaffer's Guild. This artistic glass blowing club at ISU showed the students how heat energy is transferred and stored in glass in the process of molding it. At Rebecca Shivvers' Nature Sanctuary, students were able to see how solar and wind energy can be used to power our very own homes. Since 2011, Rebecca has not paid for electricity thanks to her fifty foot wind turbine and four solar panels. Thanks to Lincoln Highway Association member Jeff Benson for connecting us to Rebecca! The students also had the chance to meet Chad Cook and Keith Kutz of the lowa Energy Center who gave a presentation on wind energy using a KidWind Kit. The last location the students visited was the Ames Resource Recovery Plant, a one-of-a-kind waste-to-energy facility located right off Lincoln Way. The plant receives garbage from Ames and surrounding communities and transforms it into Refuse Derived fuel that the Ames Power Plant uses to power 10% of Ames' electricity. It is the only such plant in lowa. Through these locations and experts along the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway, "Kids on the Byway" was able to provide this authentic learning experience to the 4th and 5th grade students of Kate Mitchell Elementary. This project demonstrates the wide variety of resources located in the communities along the Lincoln Highway, as every location was right on the byway! We are planning two more units and field trips this school year and hope to expand to more schools in the future!

Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Updates

As 2012 draws to a close and we enter the Lincoln Highway centennial year, let's take a look back over the past few months along the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. In October, representatives from the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway attended the first meeting of the Byways of lowa Coalition. This coalition will serve as a way for lowa's byways to work together on statewide efforts to strengthen all of our roadways and to advise the Byways of lowa Foundation as it prepares to begin its fundraising efforts.

I represented the Lincoln Highway as byway coordinator, along with Jeff Benson, Lincoln Highway Association member from Story County, and Penny Brown Huber, executive director of Prairie Rivers of Iowa. LHA member Kathy Dirks was also present representing the Loess Hills National Scenic Byway. Statewide fundraising and promotional efforts will be critical in strengthening lowa's byways into the future. 2013 marketing efforts are well underway. The statewide byways traveler guide produced by the lowa Department of Transportation is now being drafted, with printing planned for midwinter to allow for distribution in advance of the travel season. In exciting news, Prairie Rivers of Iowa was awarded a grant from the Central Iowa Tourism Region to produce a 2013 Lincoln Highway brochure. This funding will allow for several thousand brochures to be produced, and we will be finalizing the design of the brochure in January. This summer, the byway made arrangements to sponsor a photography class in the 2013 Iowa State Fair photo contest in honor of the Lincoln Highway centennial. Open to adult and youth photographers, this class will feature the people, towns, and way of life along the Lincoln Highway. We are excited to connect the Lincoln Highway's 100th anniversary with this lowa tradition!

Throughout the fall, I have been meeting with groups throughout our 13 counties in order to introduce myself and the byway. I am happy to meet with tourism groups, convention and visitors' bureaus, small business owners, historical societies, and others to build partnerships with the Lincoln Highway. 


