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Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Updates

In January, 2015, I started as the new Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Coordinator at Prairie Rivers of Iowa. So let me introduce myself.

My background has been in historic preservation. I served as the coordinator for the Nevada (Iowa) Historical Society

and served on the Nevada (lowa) Historic Preservation Commission for several years. I helped the Society manage their museum displays, Victorian house, and 8-acre farm site- complete with a large home, carriage house, and several outbuildings. The Commission conducted historical surveys of properties in the community (including the Lincoln Highway). In 2003, during the sesquicentennial festivities for Nevada, based on survey information, the downtown was placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

I have two grown children and my husband works for the City of Ames in the Engineering department. We have lived in Nevada, lowa since 1980. In 2006, I returned to Iowa State University for a Master of Public Administration degree, which I received in 2009. My goal was to work in the areas of economic development, heritage tourism, and historic preservation. And now I have found the perfect position! In my first few days, I attended my first Iowa Lincoln Highway Association meeting in State Center...

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The Lincoln Highway Association shall identify, preserve, interpret and improve access to the Lincoln Highway and its associated sites, pursue the appropriate measures to prevent further deterioration, destruction or alteration of the remaining sections, publicize and seek public awareness of its goals and activities for preserving and developing the LH, facilitate research about the LH, and publish a magazine for articles and news of activity relevant to the LH, work with local communities and businesses to promote the LH as a tourism destination, and be exclusively charitable and educational within the meaning of the Internal Revenue Code.

National Lincoln Highway Conference & Henry Joy Tour

For the first time, the conference will not be in a location on the Lincoln Highway as the conference is in Ann Arbor, MI and the tours will be in Detroit, MI. The conference headquarters is at the Ann Arbor Holiday Inn-3600 Plymouth Rd. 41805, exit 41 of U. S. 23, 734-769-9800 The University of Michigan at Ann Arbor is the location of the Lincoln Highway Archives. Detroit was the location of the original Lincoln Highway headquarters.

Monday is registration day. If you want to go on the pre-conference tour, meet Monday between

between 9am and 10am in Bristol, Indiana. The location will be announced on the website. We will follow the official route to Ann Arbor and register at the Holiday Inn at that time.



Tuesday, we travel to Detroit and options are to visit

Greenfield Village, Henry Ford Mudeum, and the Rouge Assembly plant (where the new F150 pickup is made). Fees are \$13 and \$14 for these tours.

Wednesday, a Detroit Tour will take us to see some of the architectural gems that remain in the somewhat ravaged and distressed city. We will see some of the Packard Plant.

On Thursday, presentations and seminars will fill the morning and in the afternoon we will visit the archives in the Bentley Library. Henry B. Joy, Roy Chappin and Jens Jensen papers are all housed there.

Friday, the LHA annual meeting will be held in the morning. You can join the Henry Joy Auto Tour if you like, which includes a tour and dinner at the Packard Proving grounds. The LHA website has more information about the tour. It starts Saturday in Utica, MI and ends in San Francisco on July 8th. Overnight in Iowa is in Ames on Monday, June 29th.


Mystery Place






Last Issue's Mystery Place



Corridor Management Planning Update By John Mazzello, CMP Project Coordinator

This winter, the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway's Corridor Management Planning process moved into a new, public, phase. In February, we held the first in a series of public meetings to introduce the Lincoln Highway, and the concept of a Corridor Management Plan, to residents around the state.

You may recall from previous issues of this newsletter that a Corridor Management Plan (CMP) is a written document setting out a long-term plan for a byway and its important resources. The Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway's original CMP was created before the Lincoln Highway was designated as an lowa Byway, so it no longer reflects the priorities of the ILHA or of Lincoln Highway communities and residents. The new revision of the CMP will reflect the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway as an active and thriving part of lowa's past and present heritage...

ILHA January Meeting Recap

The Lincoln Highway Association met on January 10, 2015 at the Community Hall in State Center. With some funding from LHA, an intern from ISU, Paul Ehrsam, has been hired at Prairie Rivers of Iowa to help with the LHA website and other projects. He was introduced to the group as well as Jan Gammon, the new Iowa Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Coordinator, who is also housed at Prairie Rivers of Iowa. She was elected as the secretary for the ILHA.

The ILHA will support the Tama-Toledo Bridge Park project and help with the application for the National Lincoln Highway Association grant for bridge repairs and improvements to the park.

In June, the 2015 National Conference will be held in Ann Arbor, Ml. Joyce Ausberger encouraged everyone to attend and will look into transportation by bus. The 2016 Conference is tentatively set for New Jersey and the 2017 in Denison, Iowa. The conference center at the Boulders is reserved and more information will follow in the coming months.

The Auto tour will be Aug 21, 22, 23 and is \$30 for an Iowa or National member or \$40 for a non-member (will include a 1-year membership).

The City of Marion is interested in working with ILHA on their railroad bridge/bike path project. Jeff Benson and John Mazzello will talk to them about adding Lincoln Highway information into their plans.

Transportation Day will be January 27th at the State Capitol and the 10 cent gas tax will be the main topic discussed. It is a good time for groups to talk to legislators on transportation issues. Everyone is encouraged to attend. The State Byways, including the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway, will have a booth in the Capitol rotunda.

The Corridor Management Plan is coming along nicely for the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. Two public meetings are planned in February for State Center/Colo and Jefferson/Scranton/Grand Junction.

After the meeting, the group toured the renovated 1895 Benson Building to be used by NuCara Pharmacy and the 1932 Home Oil Gas Station that is now home to State Center's Police Department.



The phone call we never want or expect to get is one where a person such as Jeff Benson has passed away. We received that call Wednesday, about noon, and were devastated. Over the past 25 years he and his wife Margaret have been such an important part of our lives. They were one of our hero couples, and he was certainly a hero to our Lincoln Highway family.

He was creative, positive, and adventurous in both work and play. It was always fun to visit Jeff and Margaret. Many times the reason was a Lincoln Highway "situation" and always the issues were softened by discussions about their personal lives. They were always up to something whether it was with the kids, their home, yard, garden, camping, or planning a trip. As we talked, the Lincoln Highway issue would blend in and become just part of the visit, and the sharp edges of a seemingly insurmountable problem would taper and solutions would appear. One of my regrets is that we never did get the farm compost delivered for their garden. However, we did get the wheel over to them, and had fun with a highly upscale discussion of where and how the wheel could best be displayed in their backyard/garden.

Joyce and I always learned something new about Jeff in our discussions and were especially entertained with stories about his high school and college days. Did you know that he helped organize a rock band and was quite an accomplished musician?

In the early years of our Lincoln Highway organization Jeff and Margaret were very active. They served as the second presidents and later Jeff served as secretary. He will be remembered for his handling of the Lions Club Tree Park interpretive site situation and ushering it to near completion.

His last act was to bring an explaining sign. He and Troy worked hard to keep that project moving forward. Of course the sign still hasn't been placed, and now I can't visit with Jeff about this issue.

In this project, one can see some of his many good qualities—fund raising when last minute money was needed or being able to break down complex issues into simpler parts that could be solved one at a time. And

especially important being able to reduce personality issues so that the project problems could be worked on. He was adamant about the highway being a museum and that our duties were to preserve it and its roadside features so that a story could be told about the development of the highway and road system in our country. He and Lyell developed the plan for a hierarchy of interpretive sites many years ago. This plan continues to be the guide for telling this story.

I don't remember Jeff telling jokes, but he had a great sense of humor. One day during a planning session for the Lions Club Tree Park (on the Lincoln Highway, east of Grand Junction) we were discussing monetary compensation for the "big shots" as Jeff sometimes referred to them. He suggested that the historians, architect, graphic designer, and landscape architect get equal compensation. This suggestion caused quite an uproar. Amongst shouting and disagreement, Jeff said, "Wait, wait, this was just a dream and forget that I said it."

"Context Sensitive Design" was a byword for Jeff. A country road, city street, or cross-country highway, park, bike trail, pedestrian island, etc. was not just a piece of dirt, rock, concrete or asphalt with a fore slope and back slope. To him, it represented a place in time and space. The past, present, and future needed to be reckoned with and this required planning, time, and sometimes more planning, and many times strange and unknown involvement of science, history, culture or other human or inhuman activity.

Jeff gave great presentations and programs including an adult education series at lowa State. He was good at captivating an audience and ending these in a timely manner. He was punctual with starting and ending meetings but always took time afterwards to work with people on their particular issues.

I am sure that Jeff will want Margaret and the kids to carry on and that he will want the Lincoln Highway Association to carry on. His other friends, acquaintances, and people involved in projects and his job with the city will surely feel this same challenge. Let's live up to his expectations.



Corridor Management Plan Update

The last few months have been very busy ones for the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway's Corridor Management Plan project. As you'll recall, a Corridor Management Plan, or CMP, is a long-term planning tool that identifies the byway area's strengths and opportunities, and lays out a strategy for enhancing the roadway. A major part of the CMP planning process is engaging with byway communities in order to gather priorities from residents, leaders, and organizations.

Since February, we have held community meetings in 13 Lincoln Highway communities: State Center, Jefferson, Lowden, Clinton, Boone, Belle Plaine, Ames, Toledo, Marion, Missouri Valley, Denison, Carroll, and Nevada. At each meeting, we had a great conversation about the Lincoln Highway, its important locations and assets, and each community's dreams for how the roadway might enhance the local area. Specifically, we considered the "intrinsic qualities," or the things that make the Lincoln Highway unique in six areas: historic, cultural, recreational, scenic, natural, and archaeological. From these meetings, we are assembling community priorities and strategies for reaching these goals.

More than 150 lowans have participated in these meetings so far, including many Lincoln Highway Association members. Also represented have been business owners, elected officials, government employees, leaders of community groups, and local residents. Thank you to all the ILHA members who have attended meetings or given input on this project so far. We especially appreciate the help of the members who assisted with securing meeting spaces, providing refreshments, or organizing meetings.

Meetings are currently being planned for this summer in Mt. Vernon-Lisbon, Marshalltown, and Council Bluffs. Please look for more information in your local newspaper, on the lowa Lincoln Highway Association's Facebook page, at our website at www.prrcd.org/cmp, or by phone at 515-232-0048. Jeffrey Donald Benson was born on June 28, 1952, the second child of Donald and Martha Benson, in Lawrence, Kansas. The family moved to Ames in 1958 when Donald accepted a position as an assistant Professor in the English

Department at Iowa State University. As a boy, Jeff attended the original Edwards School, followed by Welch Junior High and finally graduated from Ames High School in 1970. After spending two years at Carlton College in Northfield, Minnesota, he returned to Ames to attend a community college. While there, he studied design and eventually found work in several engineering companies.

Early in his career, he pursued an interest in landscape architecture and interned for The Design Collaborative at Ames design firm in Ames. He worked under the direction of James Sinatra and David L. Dahlquist, landscape architects.

Throughout his professional career, leff became a distinguished landscape architect through his project achievements and subsequent services to the profession. He was perhaps the one of the few to pass the State of lowa registration examination and immediately become fully registered before earning a degree in Landscape Architecture. Following his registration, he then enrolled at Iowa State to receive a B.S. degree in Landscape Architecture and continued on to receive a Master's Degree in Community and Regional Planning. In 2001, he was employed by the City of Ames Planning Department and thus held the position for 14 years. While in this position, he was responsible for many projects for the beauty and betterment of Ames. In the 1980's, he played instrumental roles in the design and development of many major products including: the Gateway Hills and Green Hills developments in Ames and the State Historical Building landscape at the State Capitol.

Jeff's success in his personal life was also mirrored in his personal life. On April 27, 1980 he married Margaret Elbert, of Ames. They have been happily married for 35 years. Jeff and Margaret have contributed many years of service and leadership to the Lincoln Highway Association. Jeff also served on the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Advisory Board and the Byways of Iowa Coalition.

Prairie Rivers of Iowa is also hosting public Corridor Management Planning (CMP) meetings in communities along the Byway. Everyone is encouraged to attend the meeting in their county. After the CMP is completed, an Interpretive Plan will be done. A current Conservation Innovation Grant (CIG) will help place two interpretive panels in the Lions Tree Park near Grand Junction and the Lincoln Prairie Park in Ogden. These signs will be in the same design all of the Byways are adopting.

The Lincoln Highway Bridge Park Tama-Toledo group applied for the National Lincoln Highway Association Grant and Tama County LHA has submitted a teacher for the National Educator Award. The Grant will be awarded at the National Convention in June. It appears they have won the educator award. Congratulations!

The 2015 Auto Tour is finalizing the tour route. The 2017 National Convention will be in Denison, lowa. Deb Rothmeyer and Jeannie Parr are the chairs for the convention and say preparations are well under way. It is unclear if the Grand Junction overpass will be completed in time for the Convention, but we hope so.

Greene County is working on a new brochure and John Fitzsimmons is doing some artwork for it. He also repainted a metal sign that will be hung in the restored gas station in State Center, now used as the police station. Bob Owens would like an article written about Portage Tires in the newsletter and submitted to the national magazine, The Forum. There is a building near the Eureka Bridge in Greene County that has an ad for Portage Tires painted on the outside and hopefully the building will be restored as an autorelated museum.

County reports were then given. Boone will be celebrating their 150th this year. It will be in conjunction with their Pufferbilly Days. Youngville Café will try to extend their hours. Tama is continuing to work on their kiosk, garden, and working on saving a tourist cabin. Harrison County has had some restaurants move to different locations and some new ones start up.



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Let the Good Times Roll

The good times were rolling as the 2015 ILHA Motor Tour took off in Kearney, Nebraska this August. On pretour sightseeing we explored in the Great Platte River Road Archway Museum with a leisurely visit through the exhibit and then out along the trail that leads to a Pawnee earth lodge and a prairie sod house. Along the trail were different art forms depicting the bison that once roamed the prairies. Following a boxed lunch, we went to the Classic Car Museum and spent hours looking over a collection of about 200 classic cars from every era of automotive history.

On Friday, we took off to see history along the Lincoln Highway, trying to keep to the original route as much as possible. We saw local landmarks such as a huge covered wagon pulled by two oxen and an old service station that has been converted into a bank. We drove past the site of the 1733 Watson Ranch, which was located 1,733 miles from both Boston and San Francisco. It was the home of a huge ranching operation that involved the introduction of alfalfa to the United States. Lenore Stubblefield of the Nebraska Association welcomed us to the Lincoln Highway Center in Shelton, NE. We got a tour of the center as well as the bank and enjoyed Lenore's hospitality.

Kensinger's Service Station, which is still in operation in Grand Island, is located right in front of an original Seedling Mile that we all walked on before leaving for Columbus. The Merrick County Courthouse in Central City is the site of the first Lincoln Highway Association meeting. In Duncan, NE there was a double line of trees that stood alongside the Lincoln Highway, now just a grass-covered park area.

As you stand at one end, you can see how the trees would have lined the road. The Andrew Jackson Higgins Memorial and a 9/11 Memorial in Columbus stand side-by-side in tribute to the military heroes of our country.

Saturday began at the historic Oak Ballroom in Schuyler. This beautiful building was constructed by the WPA in 1936 and we learned the entire park was created from the drive and actions of one local man who wanted to keep his community happy and healthy. There's no doubt one person can make a huge difference in the lives of many people!

We drove three miles of original brick-paved Lincoln Highway, but stopped along the way to take photos and learn a little about the Highway. At Boys' Town in Omaha, we had a lunch prepared by the caring staff and then the Vice Mayor of Boys' Town took us on a tour to show us the history of Father Flanagan's famous home for abandoned children. Located on the Lincoln Highway, it was possible for boys to get rides to the home from truck drivers passing through Omaha.

The Durham Museum in Omaha is in the historic and beautifully preserved Union Station with exhibits showing life during the age of the railroad. Some of us took refreshment in the original soda fountain before heading out to our hotels and a fun, relaxed banquet with door prizes and plenty of time to chat and relax.





Another Historic Building Saved Along Lincoln

The remarkable row of historic buildings, which sits along State Center's Main Street will soon see another addition to its collection of restored 1895 structures. This is the last building that the State Center Development Association needs to restore in the 100th block of West Main, a street sitting along the 1922 route of the Lincoln Highway as it winds its way through Central Iowa.

The Evans Café Building, originally a two-story structure, was built in 1895 after two fires wiped out the entire block of buildings, leaving only the Bishop Building at the west end of the block. The first occupant of the Evans Café Building was E. P. Snyder, who ran a restaurant on its first floor and a hotel on its second floor.

In the early 1910's, a widow, named Emma Evans, and her son, Oscar, acquired the building after expanding their family's bakery business into a restaurant and bakery, thus the present-day name for the building, the Evans Café Building. The Evans family continued to operate their restaurant and bakery at this site until 1925, when they both retired from the restaurant business.

Through the years, the building was leased to other restaurateurs. The Evans family continued to own the building until the death of Oscar's widow, Maude Evans, in 1951. That year, the Central lowa Telephone Company bought the building, remodeling the two-story structure into the one-story structure we see today.

The telephone company later sold the building and it was turned into a private residence. Fred Zeller, the last resident to live here, sold the building to the State Center Development Association this past March. The Development Association is renovating the building for retail use. With design assistance from the lowa Main Street program, the SCDA plans to restore the building's interior, replace the second story, and return its street-side facade to its original 1895 appearance.

Another building in State Center's Remarkable Row will soon be resurrected for future generations to see as they travel the historic Lincoln Highway through Central Iowa.

Corridor Management Plan and Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway Update

At the end of July, John Mazzello left the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway program. He had been living in upper New York State and telecommuting for a while. He decided to take a job closer to home as he and his wife are expecting their first child this fall. We wish the best to both of them!

Prior to his departure, John held the last two community input meetings in Council Bluffs and Mount Vernon/Lisbon. These two groups had great ideas and all of the notes for the 15 community meetings can be found at www.prrcd.org/cmp.

Jan Gammon, coordinator of the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway, has assumed John's duties with the Corridor Management Plan. Part of the process is to conduct an Economic Impact Study to develop a baseline and then repeat the study sometime in the future to determine the impact the Byway has on the communities and counties it travels through.

Surveys for visitors to the Byway corridor have been placed in the following locations: Sawmill Museum in Clinton, Lincoln Café and Wine Bar in Mt. Vernon, Belle Plaine Museum in Belle Plaine, King Tower in Tama, John Ernest Vineyard and Winery, Reed-Niland in Colo, Greene County LHA Museum in Grand Junction, Mahanay Bell Tower in Jefferson, Cronk's in Denison, Harrison County Historical Village and Welcome Center in Missouri Valley, and the Union Pacific Museum in Council Bluffs. The survey will go through October, so if you know of another location where we could obtain visitor information, please let Jan know at 515-232-0048.

A test-run of resident surveys was done at Lincoln Highway Days in Nevada at the end of August and the survey will be placed on-line in the next month. We will email the link out to Chambers, Historical Societies, and other interested parties to gather Byway resident's opinions.

The Byway has been busy traveling the route this summer- delivering survey packets, helping Linn County residents with information about their bridge (see article), enjoying the Meskwaki Pow Wow, attending Nevada and Story County planning meetings about wayfinding and management plans, promoting the DOT's Byway program at a H.O.G. (Harley Owners) Rally in Des Moines, delivering a missing Byway sign to

Benton County for installation, and attending National Scenic Byway training in Millersburg, Ohio.

We are about halfway through the Corridor Management Plan process and will be holding more meetings with officials and residents in each county in the coming months.

Paranormal Investigation at Reed- Niland- Colo

When strange things happen, as they have been at Niland's Cafe, one has to wonder if there may be an explanation or perhaps some paranormal activity going on. Over the past several years employees have noticed little things such as unexplained noises, taps and tugs, aprons untied and the coffee pot turned off when it should be on. These mischievous activities caused some staff to wonder if there was potential paranormal activity.

In April, requests for an investigation were sent to the three main groups who specialize in this type of investigation in Iowa. Two proposals resulted the Eastern Iowa Paranormal (EIP) group being called upon to conduct the investigation. The investigative team included four members of the EIP group along with the current cafe operator and her husband. From 9:00 PM until about 2:00 AM beginning on April 17, 2015, various sessions were conducted using the latest in infrared cameras, specialized recording devices and other methods.

The findings seem to validate some activity, particularly in the café kitchen and the restored gas station at Reed-Niland. The noises in the kitchen area, even when closed, presented a challenge to get recordings without extra noises (freezer motor, ice machine, etc.) so perhaps a future investigation will be done to further isolate those noises and gather more information.

First Woman to Travel Solo on the Lincoln Highway

Silent screen star Anita King made the first female solo drive on the Lincoln Highway across America. Three sisters are following in her footsteps as they recreate the journey of their great, great aunt Anita. Lucianne Boardman, Aleta Beckman Wilke, and Heather Pancratz left San Francisco on September 7 and arrived in New York one week later. Boardman is the only sister to have met their great, great aunt, but the sisters have an appreciation for her accomplishments and hope to inspire young girls everywhere as they blog and share a photo journal of the event.

Ms. Anita King was born Anna Keppen in Michigan City, Indiana and orphaned at the age of 16. She and her eight siblings were left to fend for themselves until she relocated to Chicago, seeking employment on the stage and reinventing herself as Anita King. Actress Lillian Russell encouraged Anita to try motion pictures in Hollywood and soon Anita followed her dream to become a famous actress in Hollywood. She starred in more than 19 silent movies, many of them directed by Cecil B. DeMille.

King was challenged by DeMille and director Jesse Lasky to drive the newly christened Lincoln Highway from San Francisco to New York. She started out on September 1, 1915 and completed the trip in 49 days without a mechanic or security- demonstrating a woman's strength at a time when women were considered secondary citizens. She was dubbed the Paramount Girl and her journey was a goldmine for the Paramount studio who gave her a rigorous itinerary to meet fans and conduct public event in cities along the way. Newspapers told stories of defending herself against a coyote attack, changing tires, and completing general maintenance along the way. It took her 49 days to make the journey.

She took the fame and publicity and started a shelter for runaway girls in Hollywood who found themselves friendless and victimized by the Hollywood machine. This cause was picked up by Cecil B. DeMille's wife, Constance.

The reenactment took place on the 100th year anniversary of Anita's trip and the three sisters retraced her steps, stopped at some of the same places Anita did, and tried to make her journey in seven days. Linn County- Bloomington Road Bridge

During a Corridor Management Plan community input meeting in Marion this past spring, resident Allan Viktor mentioned that a bridge on Bloomington Road that crosses Big Creek on the loop section of the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway was scheduled to be replaced this next year. Steve Gannon, Linn County Engineer, stated that bids were to be let for the project in September.

This summer, Mr.Viktor asked the Board to reconsider other options for the bridge. He used information from the 2012 DOT bridge inspection report and from the Tallgrass Historians, LC's "Inventory of County-Owned Historic Sites and Properties in Linn County" written in 2010 as well as testimonials from local farmers and residents to present his case to the Board.

Bloomington Road was the original Lincoln Highway but after diverting the route to Mount Vernon Road instead and bypassing Marion altogether, this road was never paved and today remains gravel. This current bridge replaced a Bowstring Bridge on a different alignment of the creek. The original abutments are visible and were at one time considered as a location for interpretation. This bridge was built in 1925, after the Lincoln Highway was moved, according to the DOT inspection report and the Tallgrass Historians, LLC report. Although it is 90 years old and one of the few truss-type bridges in the County, it is not being considered for the National Register as it falls out of context with the Lincoln Highway's association with Bloomington Road. It is on a loop of the Byway, however, and is an important feature in telling the story of rivers, roads, and the Lincoln Highway. Today, art classes visit the bridge area to draw and paint the prairie landscape, creek, and bridge. Many kids ride bikes to the bridge and fish the area.

In the DOT inspection, the bridge scored 50 out of 100 points (the higher the score, the worse the bridge.) Other bridges in Linn County scored in the 70's. It does have a weight limit of 10 tons, which has been in force for several years. The DOT traffic count is 90 cars per day, but locals think it is more like 10 per day. If farmers need to move equipment, they go a different way and avoid the bridge altogether. It is a quiet and quaint gravel section of road. Resident Jackie Moore said if this was made into a 2-lane bridge, everyone would start using it as a short cut to Marion and cause more traffic at another already bad intersection.

The 2010 Tallgrass report says, "Whatever problems on this bridge that may be causing that low rating, they certainly could be easily corrected through a rehabilitation project. There is actually very little black rust or section loss on this bridge's trusses, even on the traditionally troublesome areas such as the bottom chord



connections."

Steve Gannon, Linn County Engineer, said he thought the last time it was painted was 1946. He started in the Engineering Department in 1974 and he knows it has not been painted since he has been there. Gannon states it will cost \$1.5-2 million to repair, in his estimation. The cost to rebuild is \$550,000 and they have about \$300,000 in Federal dollars to use towards a newly built bridge.

The Board weighed information and made a decision on September 2nd by a vote of 4-1 to remove the old bridge and replace it with a new one. Citizens may try to appeal the decision.

Portage Rubber Company

This spring, just west of Jefferson, Iowa, Randy Monthei removed some tar paper from an old shed on his property and discovered a ghost sign for Portage Tires. The sign is in pretty good shape on the 110 year-old shed. An overhang and the tar paper had protected it from the elements.

The shed is along the Lincoln Highway, the first transcontinental road, and was used as advertising for the tire company. Many early travelers drove along this route and often structures like this along the road were used to advertise auto-related items. Not a lot of information is available on the Portage Tire Company, but we have found some about the company and its relationship to the tire industry and the Akron/Barberton area.

The Portage Rubber Company was started in Barberton, OH in 1910. The Indians had used this area as a portage or "carrying place" between Lake Erie and the Ohio River. The name Portage is used often in the area around Barberton and Akron. An example is the Portage Lakes which is a nearby string of lakes. There is also a Portage township and a Portage County.

Barberton is very close to Akron, OH and is a "planned industrial community" with Lake Anna in the

center, surrounded by a circle of homes that are encircled by manufacturing and a rail line. Ohio Columbus (O.C.) Barber inherited his father's matchstick company and in 1891 it was consolidated under the name Diamond Match Company. He became known as "America's Match King". He bought 550 acres of land 5 miles from Akron and hoped he'd find natural gas to aid in manufacturing strawboard boxes. The Portage Strawboard Company was created as he needed boxes for his matches. The land he had bought was not suitable for his needs, so he created and designed the town Barberton instead and found other manufacturers to set up factories and manufacturing in the community, like Portage Tires.

Nearby Akron was known as the "Rubber Manufacturing Headquarters of the World" and produced more than half of the world's tires and rubber goods in the early 1900's. Every rubber article, from the tiniest rubber washer to dirigibles, was made in this area.

Almost all of the rubber was imported from Brazil. Cotton was also used in the manufacturing of early tires. The Salt River of Arizona, the sand dunes of Southern California and along the Nile saw mammoth cotton plantations develop. In New England, cotton and spinning mills flourished to create the millions of yards of fabric required in this rubber industry.

The first rubber product was a fire hose created by Goodrich and the first tires were solid rubber bands for wheels of high bicycles in the 1890's. Then as the automobile came on the scene, manufacturing needs changed.

In 1898, Frank Augustus (F.A.) Seiberling co-founded the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company with his brother, Charles, in Akron. In 1921, Goodyear was reorganized and refinanced. Charles and F.A. resigned and then F.A. established the Seiberling Rubber Co. He acquired the factory of the former Portage Tire and Rubber in Barberton. We can surmise then that Portage Tire had a life of less than 11 years. Firestone bought Seiberling's plant in 1965 and then in 1980 the plant closed down, putting 1,000 workers out of business.

Today there are three companies that use the factory site. They recycle pallets, recycle polymer and compounds, and make carbon black for rail use.

Hi-Way Gardens Inducted into the Rock 'n Roll Hall of Fame

The Hi-way Gardens, located in Stanwood, was inducted into the Rock 'n Roll Hall of Fame over the Labor Day weekend in Arnold's Park, Iowa. The Hi-Way Gardens was a swinging venue for decades. The ballroom was located in Stanwood on the Lincoln Highway (Hwy 30) and began operating in the early 1920's.

The ballroom was built by Robert McClellan and Elwood Resewehr as an open-air dance pavilion. In 1936, McClellan bought out his partner and enclosed the dance floor, added a lunch room and bar, and served alcoholic beverages for the first time.


Over the many years that Robert and Grace McClellan ran the ballroom, they featured big bands and famous singers like Wayne King, Tiny Hill, Guy Lombardo, Lawrence Welk, Hank Thompson and Brazo Valley Boys, Jerry Lee Lewis and Conway Twitty. They also supported local bands- Leo Greco and the Pioneers, Tom Owen's Cowboys, Kenny Hofer, the Escorts, Dale Thomas and the Bandera Boys, the Untouchables, Deliverance, the XL's and many more.

The couple operated the ballroom until Grace was killed by a car on Jan I, 1967 while walking home from the ballroom after a New Year's Party. Bob sold the ballroom in 1972 and it changed hands a few more times. In 1979, George Bush appeared there while running for President of the United States. A wrecking ball took the ballroom down in February 2007.

Lowden Installs Original Lincoln Highway Marker

Approximately 2,430 Lincoln Highway markers were installed by the Boy Scouts of America on Sept. 1, 1928. To commemorate the event, members of Lowden's Cub Scout Troop No. 160, former Boy Scouts, and volunteers installed a recovered Lincoln Highway Marker in the Lowden City park. The marker was recovered in Clinton for the Lincoln Highway Association by LHA member Joe Goodlove of Lowden. In a joint effort by Joe and Lowden resident, Barry Hoffmeier, the marker was acquired from the ILHA for the City of Lowden.

The Lincoln Highway was named by the Lincoln Highway Association on July 1, 1913 to honor Abraham Lincoln, the 16th President of the United States. The LHA wanted to create the nation's first transcontinental highway and thought a patriotic name would sell the project to investors. The Lincoln Highway originally ran coast to coast for 3,389 miles from New York's Time Square to San Francisco's Lincoln Park and ran through 13 states. Due to realignments and improvements, the route was shortened to 3,142 miles by 1924. The Highway was marked by signs with a red, white, and blue rectangle, with a large blue "L" and the words "Lincoln Highway" stenciled in the white portion.

In 1926, the American Association of State Highway Officials and the Joint Board on Interstate Highways created a more uniform sign and numbering system to identify the nation's highways. Most of the Lincoln Highway route became US Highway 30, with portions becoming US 1 in the East and US 40, US 50, and US 93 in the West. Due to realignment, today's Highway 30 aligns with less than 25% of the original 1913-1928 Lincoln Highway route.

With the numbering system in effect, the LHA embarked on one final effort to mark the route of the Lincoln Highway and Continued on page 2

to honor Abraham Lincoln. The LHA approved the casting of 3,000 concrete markers, which would be placed along the Lincoln Highway. The markers carried the familiar red, white, and blue Lincoln Highway symbol. Also, each marker had a bronze inset of Lincoln's bust and the words; "This Highway Dedicated to Abraham Lincoln."

On September 1, 1928, the LHA partnered with the Boy Scouts of America to install 2,436 of these markers along the Lincoln Highway, from coast to coast.

To some, the first transcontinental highway united the nation that Lincoln fought to save and made the Lincoln Highway a fitting symbol to remember the 16th President.








Bridge on Bloomington Road in Linn County

Lincoln Hotel in Lowden Celebrates 100 Years

The Lincoln Hotel in Lowden, lowa celebrates its 100th birthday this year. The Lincoln Hotel is a Lincoln Highway gem that is featured in both Brian Butko's Greetings from the Lincoln Highway and Drake Hokinson's The Lincoln Highway: Main Street across America. The Hotel has served travelers on the Lincoln Highway since Celia Dean Clemens opened for business on June 17, 1915. On that day, guests paid \$2 per day for a room and could enjoy a steak dinner for 75 cents. The contemporary prairiesque architecture gave the hotel a modern twist at the time. The electric lights, steam heat, and the bathroom with running water provided comforts not always available to travelers in 1915. The Lincoln Hotel was the only lodging between Clinton and Cedar Rapids when it was built and Celia enjoyed a brisk business, servicing both the rail and highway travelers.

The Hotel stood in witness of the progress of the Lincoln Highway. The highway was originally a dirt road. On April 27, 1917 paving began in Lowden and was complete through Cedar County on Oct. 27 of that year. On September 7, 1925 the Lowden City Council ordered all hitching posts on the streets of the business district be removed within 30 days. Autocross guests first purchased buckets of gasoline at the livery stable on the north side of the hotel. Later gasoline became available at the general store and in the early 20's the Hawkeye Filling Station opened. On Aug 14, 1925, the Freund Garage was making improvements and a new gas tank and pump were added along with the cement walk repaired to meet the increase in business. In 1928, H.C. Kaman & Sons erected a Standard Station and a Phillips 66 opened in November of 1934. The traffic kept coming; Model T's became Hudson's, the '57 Chevys became SUVs.

Celia remained the innkeeper for 31 years when she sold the business to John and Anna Stickpin who tended to the business for 10 years. Donna and Prince Hudson Ir. purchased it in 1956 and assigned the contract to Mary Louise Wiles within a year of ownership. Mary Louise ran the hotel for seven years. On Oct. 7, 1967, William and Arlene Cederberg purchased the business and Arlene ran it for 13 years. The building stood vacant until Lincolnway Hotel, Inc. purchased it for the purpose of historic preservation in 1991. Brad Norton and Sue Licht, on behalf of the

corporation, renovated the building. The hotel opened as an apartment building for low income housing in the spring of 1996. At that time the hotel was presented with the "Preservation at Its Best Award" from the Iowa Historic Preservation Alliance and had earned a spot on the List of Historic Places on the National Historic Register.

The hotel operated as a residential facility until 2001 when Brad and Elizabeth Norton purchased the business. Elizabeth took over management and gradually converted the apartments to five spacious suites with private baths. She also introduced an optional gourmet breakfast served either in the room or in the dining room. The seventh room offers a space for a massage therapist. Elizabeth has served travelers from as far as Vienna, Norway, and Germany, hosted family reunions with families coming together from both coasts of the United States, entertained the organizers of RAGBRAI, and provided the comforts of home to the many other travelers who travel the highway for business and pleasure.

After 100 years, six innkeepers, and an unknown number of guests who shared the comforts of the Lincoln Hotel, the Norton's, in their 60's, are now thinking of retirement and looking for a new keeper for this stately building and place of repose. The Lincoln Hotel will continue to serve highway travelers and witness change on the Lincoln Highway as it once again outlives its innkeepers.



CMP and **LHHB** Coordinator Report

As part of the Corridor Management Plan process, we held 15 community meetings across the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. The information that came out of these meetings will be used as we write up our plan in the coming year. More small meetings will be held with city administrators and government officials to blend our plans with their plans, when possible, for unified strategies along the Byway.

We are working on a "points of interest" map by intrinsic quality (Historical, Cultural, Recreational, Natural, Scenic, and Archeological) and will combine important points the residents suggested with points already identified.

We will use this same information to create a new brochure for the Byway. We received an Iowa Tourism Grant towards the creation of this new document and we are excited to get it designed and printed.

As the coordinator of the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway and a resident of Nevada, I have attended a DOT, Story County Board of Supervisor, and Nevada City Council meetings regarding the changes to Highway 30 between Nevada and Ames. The DOT has presented the City with 2 proposals. The one preferred, will do away with any at-grade crossings between the two towns and add an interchange just east of I35 near the new churches and DOT garage and an interchange at 610th (also known as Airport Rd or W 18th St). It will also close off the 6th St (Main Street) exit. The only way to enter Nevada then will be at 19th St (McDonald's exit) or at 610th (Airport Rd/W 18th).

Farmers and truckers are upset because they need to travel to the Lincoln Highway where the Co-op, LincolnWay ethanol plant, and new DuPont Cellulose Plant are located. They will have to drive several miles to gain access to the Lincoln Highway. Travel on these new interchanges is not conducive to large equipment and their line-of-sight for other traffic. Several of them farm both sides of Highway 30, and it will cost more in fuel to go around to an access point rather than just cross the road.

Residents are upset, especially rural folks to the south, as they need to go miles out of their way- to either Ames or Nevada- to even access Highway 30. Visitors from the east, if missing the 19th St (McDonald's exit) will probably keep driving to Ames rather than taking a convoluted exit and backtracking to a new road that will lead to Main St.

Business people are upset because the exit to Main St will be closed off. Downtown Nevada struggles as it is. Vetter Farm Equipment spent 8.5 million in a new facility to be near Highway 30. They will find themselves on a dead-end road with no access to the highway. Case IH training center, across the road from Vetter, trains several thousand people every year and they won't have easy access either.

For all of the reasons above, semi, truck, farm equipment, resident, and visitor traffic will increase on Lincoln Highway. This will increase the accidents on the road and deter anyone from using the bike path that was installed a few years ago.

The Nevada City Council met November 23rd and voted to "reject the proposed plan and create a task force to look into other alternatives."


