VAN BECKER TO RUN FOR NATIONAL LHA AT-LARGE DIRECTOR POSITION

Every year the National Lincoln Highway Association elects directors to its board. There are 14 state directors positions and four at-large positions. Currently, Jeff LaFollette is the Iowa State Director. Last year, Van Becker of Cedar Rapids was appointed by national LHA president Bob Dieterich to fill a vacant at-large director position.

Van has agreed to run for a full three year term as an at-large director on the Lincoln Highway Association Board, Van was previously an executive advisor to the national president of the LHA, and has been President of the lowa Chapter of the Lincoln Highway Association for two terms. He and his wife Bev hosted the National LHA Conference in Cedar Rapids, Iowa in 2006. Van is very familiar with the people and the mission of the organization.

Since he joined the LHA in 1996, Van has attended 86% of the national conferences. Most of all, he does this because he wants to, and not because it will enhance his resume.

Van voluntarily enlisted in the US Army during the Vietnam Era and served as a radar instructor in the Signal Corps, which culminated in a short tour in Korea. He was honorably discharged from the US Army in 1969. He graduated from St. Ambrose College in Davenport, Iowa with a BA

degree in business administration.

Van was employed by Rockwell-Collins as an international contract He left Rockwell-Collins, manager.



because needed to acquire sales experience to qualify promotion. Van also held various highdollar sales

positions including the sale of vintage collecti-

ble cars. He returned to Rockwell-Collins as a professional radio operator and capitalized on his unique combination of FCC radio licenses and security clearances. Van retired from Rockwell-Collins late in 2007.

Van has been a licensed amateur radio operator since 1962. His call letters are WØVAN. He is the license trustee of the Lincoln Highway Amateur Radio Group, Recently Van acquired the new current call letters for the group which are NY2SF, (New York to San Francisco, the route of the Lincoln Highway)

Van is married to his wife Bev. and has lived in the same home in Cedar Rapids, Iowa for over 30 years.



March is a time of rebirth with the coming of spring. Along with the change of season is the time that basketball fans affectionately call "March Madness" The madness struck several communities along the Lincoln Highway this year. Cedar Rapids placed two teams in the Class 4A state basketball tournament. Ames won the Class 4A title for the second year in a row. Carroll qualified in Class 3A and Carroll Kuemper finished third in Class 2A. And the madness struck the Clinton county communities of Calamus and Wheatland as the Cal-Wheat Warriors finished second in Class 1A.

Calamus and Wheatland entered a whole grade sharing agreement in 1985 and the two schools consolidated in 1990. The last time either Calamus or Wheatland was in the state basketball tournament was 50 years ago in 1960 when the Wheatland Wildcats had a record of 23-1 going into the 1960 state tourney. In a poll of 18 sportswriters across lowa, 14 picked defending state champion Calumet. Three favored Hudson. Only the sportswriter from the *Ottumwa Courier* picked Wheatland.

Wheatland defeated New Vienna St. Boniface 53-48 in the district final. In the state quarterfinal, Wheatland defeated Douds-Leando 66-46. In the semis, they beat Moorhead 67-56 to set up the championship game against defending state champ Calumet.

Enrollment for Class B teams were schools with 101 students or less. Wheatland had an enrollment of 97, just five students shy of being a Class A school, Calumet, on the other hand had an enrollment of only 36.

Wheatland came out strong and led Calumet 34-19 at the half, but Calumet came back in the second half and tied the game in the final minutes. With nine seconds left. Wheatland scored the winning basket to win the game by a score of 61-59. The Wildcats ended the season as champions with a record of 27-1.

According to the *Davenport Times*, a forerunner of the *Quad City Times*, Wheatland was a "ghost town" on Friday and Saturday when the final two games were played at the lowa Fieldhouse in lowa City. There were fewer than 500 people in the town and almost everyone trokked to lowa City in two chartered busses and a caravan of cars. When the team

returned to town late Saturday night after its championship victory, it was greeted by a parade of 200 vehicles, headed by the town's fire truck.

Imagine a caravan of 200 vehicles heading into town along the Lincoln Highway. I'll bet it was quite a traffic jam along that stretch of US 30 and even into Wheatland along the old Lincoln Highway.

As the years have passed most all small schools have consolidated, and all the teams Wheatland played in the 1960 tournament have been absorbed into consolidated districts. Calumet, the team that Wheatland defeated has been absorbed into South O'Brien High School in Paullina. But as Wheatland can be proud of their 1960 champions, the communities of Calamus and Wheatland can be equally proud of the 2010 Class 1A runner up. Congratulations to all the schools along the Lincoln Highway who participated in the lowa state basketball tournament. And to Calamus-Wheatland, we hope it won't be another 50 years before your team makes it back to the state tourney.

State Center, Iowa Keeping History Alive Along the Lincoln Highway

As I sat down with Harlan Quick, Everett Halsted and Mike Kielly in the new State Center Development office, I soon realized that State Center, located in western Marshall County, is a community with a long history of volunteerism and local pride. From the beginning of the 20th Century, State Center's Main Street, located along the original Lincoln Highway, has been a focal point of pride for the community.

State Center's footprint in Marshall County has not changed much over the last 100 years; its population is about the same. Like most small communities, State Center has seen many of its residents go from working in State Center to commuting to other larger towns for employment. The people of State Center, however, have kept a strong sense of identity.

This article is meant to share some of the things that have made a difference in State Center. They have steadily built on their past with the future in mind. This process has provided economic benefits to the city and has brought pride to its residents. Their efforts have created a jewel on the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway.

In 1913-1914, plans for the Lincoln Highway route through State Center were put into place. Ira Kauffman, a local doctor and president of the local Automobile Club, worked to bring the Lincoln Highway down Main Street. The town invested in curb and gutter on Main Street and graveled the route through town in 1917-1918. It was hoped this would ensure the permanent Lincoln Highway would pass through State Center. In 1922, the signs for the Lincoln Highway were moved to Main Street from a temporary route running along the north edge of State Center. In 1925, the Main Street route was paved along with the rest of the Lincoln Highway across Marshall County. Businesses thrived and continued to prosper until a gradual decline began with the realigning of Highway 30 in 1930-1931; this realignment directed the main flow of traffic away from downtown State Center. Changes in transportation and a decreasing farm population contributed to the decline of small farm to market towns like State Center.

Dr. Kauffman left a living trust to the community. Following the death of his wife and only daughter, the trust transferred to the City of State Center, which created the Kauffman Charitable Trust. The mission of the Kauffman Trust is to benefit the quality of life of the residents of the City of State Center and the surrounding area.

For the most part, the community remained the same until the 1980's, when the agricultural crisis hit

and accelerated what had been a gradual decline. At that time, the State Center Development Association, with the support of the City Council, chartered a 501(c)3 non-profit group. This move helped the community secure grants and financial opportunities in an offort to counter the farming crisis and reduce its impact on the community. Meanwhile, the storefronts and general appearance of Main Street continued to deteriorate.

Watson's Grocery, which had been in operation since 1885, closed in 1981 after its owner, Florence Watson, was no longer able to maintain it. The present building was built in 1895 after a fire destroyed the original. This store and its interior had changed little since its construction. The store sat just as Florence left it until she passed away in 1989. This was a turning point. A local preservation effort to save Watson's Grocery began with widespread community support.

The newly formed "Committee to Save Watson's" recognized Watson's as a local historical treasure. They, along with the support of other State Center area residents, raised funds to buy the building and its contents. In 1990, Florence Watson's heirs put the property and its contents up for auction, the building and about 75% of the contents were purchased by the Committee, and the work to make the store a museum and repository of local history began. The need to maintain and operate Watson's Grocery as a museum resulted in the formation of the State Center Historical Society.

In 2000, producers of the movie <u>Rain</u> were choosing a setting for their independent film. They identified State Center for their filming location based on the "rundown" Midwestern appearance of the town. That designation was an eye-opener for the citizens of State Center. The challenge facing the residents was how to fix up the town, while keeping in mind the need to fix up and make the empty storefronts economically viable once again. (continued on page 4)

The Iowa Department of Economic Development's Main Street Iowa Program started in State Center in 2000. The mission of the Main Street Iowa Program is to improve the social and economic well being of Iowa's communities by assisting selected communities in capitalizing on their unique identity, assets, and the character of their historic commercial districts. Main Street Iowa is economic development within the context of historic preservation. This, along with the Iowa Department of Transportation's Community Visioning program, helped focus the direction for improvements within the community and priorifized the projects the community had identified in surveys conducted with the help of planners from Iowa State University.

The building next to Watson's Grocery was empty, its floor falling in, and its roof damaged. Renovation of the decrepit building was needed to keep the appearance of the historic Main Street intact. With the help of many volunteers, the Main Street lowa program, and a number of grants, work began. Many volunteer hours later, 104 West Main was restored. The building was sold to the Mitchell Family Funeral Home in 2005, giving the State Center Development Association funds for future renovation projects.

In 2006, the State Center Historical Society and State Center's Main Street Iowa Program became part of the State Center Development Association, combining economic development and historic preservation that has served State Center well.

Completed projects include new Main Street paving and lighting, and a new Main Street grocery store. Preservation of historic architectural design on the storefronts, combined with residential space on the second floors and back portions of the buildings, made restoration feasible. State Center continues to attract new residents and new businesses.

State Center has found success due to five factors:

- 1. They have worthwhile ideas or projects to attract volunteers and supporters.
- 2. They have progressive and supportive City Council members who crossover from other community groups.
- 3. There is a working Main Street lowa organization in place.
- 4. They have vision for projects that will fill a need, both now and in the future.
- 5. There has been charitable giving to the State Center community from two charitable trusts.

Their current projects along the Lincoln Highway route include: a renovation of the building at 127 West Main, adding shutters to the one room Washington Center School and also signage along the routes of the Lincoln Highway.

The newly designated Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway is providing additional energy and resources for the ongoing efforts in State Center and other communities.

Next time you travel the Lincoln Heritage Byway, be sure to take time to visit State Center, "The Rose Capital of Iowa".



AMATEUR RADIO MEETS THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY

The select group of lowa amateur radio operators who for the last two years have operated a summer "special event" radio station on the air celebrating 95 and then 96 years along the Lincoln Highway have banded together under the name Lincoln Highway Amateur Radio Group (LH-ARG). Under this new name, we applied to the Federal Communications Commission for a special call sign to use during on the air club operations. We are pleased to announce our Lincoln Highway Amateur Radio Group now holds the unique call sign: NY2SF... "New York to San Francisco." From the Eastern terminus to the Western terminus of the historic Lincoln Highway.

Only one station can hold this special call sign and the issuance is permanent, not temporary. The new call letters will be used proudly and often during our future special event operations. As in the past, the Lincoln Highway Amateur Radio Group plans to team with the Benton County Amateur Radio Club to operate another special event station colebrating 97 Years along the Lincoln Highway from Youngville Station the weekend immediately before the National Lincoln Highway Conference. Key officers of the new LH-ARG are Van & Bev Becker, LHA Life Members. Last year's special event spread the word of the Lincoln Highway to almost 1000 different stations in 3 countries. BRICK MURAL DEDICATED DURING CEREMONY AT BELLE PLAINE MUSEUM

On May 2nd a dedication to the Legacy of the Belle Plaine Area was held at the Belle Plaine Area Museum to commemorate the brick mural that

adorns the west wall of the building.

The mural depicts the growth and development of the community and the Benton County area through agriculture, architecture, and transportation. The mural is sculpted brick artwork which begins by carving pictures or designs into stacked blocks of wet clay. The clay is fired and the mason reassembles the finished bricks into their original order. This form of artwork dates back over 3000 years to the walled citles of ancient Mesopotamia.

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
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HAVE SPARE TIRE, WILL TRAVEL

STANWOOD ONE-POST FILLING STATION

Lincoln Highway travelers in eastern lowa should be familiar with this eyesore in Stanwood. The one-post canopy filling station still stands today with a faded Lincoln Highway logo painted on the post.



Back in the mid-40's, the station owner was Louie Luedeman and Merle Lehrman, nephew of Louie, was hired to run it. Over a bla Sunday dinner, Merle shared the following reminiscences of those days. Despite rumors to the contrary, the station has always been a one-post canopy station. In those early days, they pumped regular and ethyl Conoco gasoline on either side of the post. Working alone, Merle pumped gas, fixed tires, washed cars for \$1 and Simonized a sedan for \$10 to \$12. There was originally an outside drive-over oil pit for oil changes and grease jobs. In the winter those were cold jobs. The small station also served as a Greyhound bus depot. Only once while Merle operated it was the station robbed. The thieves made off in the night with a bag of quarters and a German P-38 pistol. Gas sold for only 27 cents a gal-Ion back then so quarters were plentiful. The thieves missed the Greyhound cash receipts that were tucked away under the counter.

There was plenty of competition for the motorists' quarters in Stanwood. There were three other stations in the small town! One station was uptown in the business district and the other two were also along the Lincoln Highway.

The real estate market has changed quite a bit since Merle operated the station. Back in the late 40's, the whole business and station were offered for only \$3000. Money was tight and Merle declined the offer.

lowa Lincoln Highway members may recall a frigid due-diligence visit a few years back when a local realtor tried to interest the lowa LHA officers in an opportunity to purchase the station, with or without junk, for \$35,000. Your wise LHA officers told the realtor no. That was way too much money. What would we have done with it?



While still in Stanwood, today hungry road warriors can stop for a good snack at Ditto's. The sign on the outside corner of the building seems stuck on broasted chicken and catfish. Both are good, as I can attest, and I have the spare tire to prove it. Do any of you remember what was at that location before Ditto's restaurant? Yes, it was a good oldfashioned A&W Root Beer stand complete with carhops. (I couldn't find a photo; does anyone have a photo of this A&W stand to share?) Glass blocks on inside walls in strange places and lumps under the carpet that cause some tables to rock are all that remain of the tasty era of that earlier time. Before WW II, the whole strip where Ditto's stands was corn fields.

That should do it—Food, gas and a spare tire—that's all I need to create an article.

HIGH TECH MAPPING OF THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY HERITAGE BYWAY IN IOWA

Through a grant from the Federal Highway Administration, the lowa Scenic Byways Sustainability project is in the process of mapping all of the byways in lowa using Trimble handheld GPS units. These units pick up satellite signals that allow the person using the unit to accurately mark the location of businesses, historical sites, and other points of interest along the byways.

Volunteers have already begun work on the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway, mapping key historical features such as the 1928 concrete markers, historic bridges and segments of original pavement, as well as every building listed on the National Register of Historic Sites that is on or near the route, and public amenities such as restaurants, public restrooms, parks and motels.

Each volunteer borrows the GPS unit form the RC &D office and staff members train them on how to use the unit (it usually takes about 30 minutes) as well as provide them with a list of locations to mark. After the locations have been marked or mapped, the unit is returned to the RC&D office so that the data can be downloaded onto a computer generated map.

The GPS units also take pictures and these pictures are linked to the locations that are marked. As a result, in the future, interactive maps of the Lincoln Highway and other byways in lowa can be created where a person can click on a point on the map and immediately see a photograph of that location as well as read information about that site.

This mapping project is under the direction of the Northeast Iowa RC&D in Postville in partnership with the Iowa Valley and Golden Hills RC&D's. The staff of the M&M Divide RC&D and the Prairie Rivers RC&D will coordinate volunteers in their counties as the mapping progresses across the state.

The actual GPS mapping of locations will be completed this summer, while work on the maps themselves will go on for several months afterward.



Last but not least, the LHA Endowment committee gave out three grants this year totaling \$10,000. Iowa



for their help and assistance over the past two years. The association is only as good as its members and we have some great ones.



- Support Jeff LaFollette's River-to-River Motor Tour.
 This functions as a money maker and recruiting tool. Besides. it's fun tool

- Ongoing discussion to mark the site near Montour where LHA Field Secretary Henry Osterman fatally crashed his Packard.
- Cooperate with Iowa State Tourism on matters along the LH corridor.

Of course, our core objectives remain to identify, recognize and protect historic sites, to preserve and protect remnants of the LH highway and vintage roadside culture and to support efforts to improve highway safety.



Welcome to the new year of 2011 or 2K11 as some people may say. It will be another great year along the Lincoln Highway. My travels are extensive, but yours are greater I am sure and I look for your help in making this another successful year. Your efforts have made the LHA of lowa a success.

Tama County is my lifelong home along the highway and I am thankful for the many great places on the Lincoln Highway, with the Lincoln Highway Bridge in Tama, a true landmark for Abraham Lincoln. Remember that four miles North on US 63 you will find land that was deeded to Lincoln after his service days. I hope that we all remember the vast historical, natural and cultural enjoyment we all may experience along the highway.

My "Along the Highway" in Tama County would read like this: Arriving from Benton County a slow 10 minute drive to Chelsea you would experience the vast land of the lowa River Corridor to the South and all of its natural beauty. You may wish to take in a historical cemetery to the North or just waiting to arrive in Chelsea. A stop at the Silver Dollar, which you may call one of the "Glad Hands Ciub" members of days past, where you will find a dozen historical pictures of early life in the town and stories of the floods. Or you may want to explore the early century library and other sites of the old home town for many.

Onward to Tama past the Otter Creek Marsh and an original one room school house on the right just before the intersection with new 30. The next two mile stretch of road takes you to Gladstone over the old Rail Road right away with the few remaining buildings that may soon go to another new road. A short jaunt further and you may take in the John Ernest Winery, or go over the hill and you will be surprised that a mile of the road is gone and you enter the new expressway. Remember exit 204 takes you down to the King Tower Café, another "Glad Hands Club" candidate.

Forward to the bridge, through Tama, including stop at Sweet Reaps for coffee and antiquing, old pictures of Tama, the Glad Hands Club and maybe a short trip to Toledo, the Courthouse, Museum, Libraries, Schools or all the other local culture. Historical accounts will say that the original Army Convoy stopped in Traer with its Winding Stairway, and over to Gladbrook where there now is a Matchstick Museum.

our with an early 1900's bank building and Rube's Steakhouse, another Glad Hands Club candidate and all the surrounding farms, lakes, and just plain old lowa life as it is and has been and on into Marshall County. The trip may have been an hour, a day, a week, or in my case a lifetime.

BOOK REVIEW: IOWA'S AUTOMOBILES

An Entertaining & Enlightening History By Bill Jepsen Review by Jeff LaFollette

This is my first book review, and I couldn't have picked a better one to start with!

Growing up I had a love of cars and history. My dad was very meticulous on taking care of his cars and I guess I come by it naturally. I guess that is why I enjoy organizing the motor tour because I get to see so many unique styles of cars. I think that is why the book "lowa's Automobiles" written by Boone, lowa resident Bill Jepsen intrigued me so much.

Bill, who was born and raised in Davenport, Iowa has compiled a wonderful history of the early automobile industry in Iowa in the years of the early 20th century. Bill breaks down the history of the automobile in lawa into six categories in his book. Dreams, Schemes & Misinformation, those that had an intention of being built but never got off the drawing board. Yes-No-Maybe, showing that there are entries for reference material but no evidence of an actual auto being produced. One-Off's & Limited, stating that there was one example produced, or a limited number for personal use. Prototypes, proving that there were one or two machines with the intent to attract potential investors, and Manufactured, meaning that there was a production facility set up to produce vehicles for sale. There is also a category called Just For Kids (Young & Old), for miniature automobiles that are propelled by an engine. Unfortunately pedal cars do not qualify, but this is a fun category nevertheless!

Each category lists lowa's communities alphabetically and tells the story and history of autos that were dreamed, built, and actually manufactured in lowa. Most of the automobiles in this book are from a timeframe of 1900-1920, with notable exceptions like the Morrison Electric from Des Moines built in 1890, with a total of 12 being produced, selling for \$3600 each, to a vehicle as recent as 1983-84 called the Litestar, which resembled the fuselage of a jet engine at first glance. This vehicle was touted to go 100 miles per hour and get 100 miles per gallon, and was to be produced in the Carroll/Scranton area. I said "to be produced", because the vehicle was eventually produced in Michigan. There's a lot more interesting information to this story, but not enough space here to tell it.

Bill's book has 15 pages of color photos of vehicles that were actually built in lowa and are still in existence, plus photos of manufacturing facilities then and now, and other bits and pieces of the lowa automobile industry. The book has many, many pic-



tures throughout, over 200 photos of old advertisements, illustrations, etc.

Some other examples of lowa autos include the Meteor from Bettendorf, The Mason from Des Moines, which became known as the "Maytag" because of an

investment from Fred Maytag of Newton, he of the well known Maytag Company which makes appliances. Mr. Maytag moved production of the car to Waterloo. The Spaulding from Grinnell, and many, many more.

The last section has personality profiles people who deserve special notice in lowa history. These individuals are William Galloway, Fred & August Dusenberg and Walter Chrysler. Yes, Walter Chrysler of Chrysler Motor Company. Mr. Chrysler had an lowa connection, as a resident of Oelwein, with "experiences that would later propel him to become one of the true pioneers of automotive history".

I would highly recommend this book to anyone who has an interest in automobiles and automotive history. Bill's research is extremely thorough, and he painstakingly put this book together to be historically accurate. He visited many libraries, viewed microfilms, and worked very hard putting this book together to piece together the history of lowa's automobile industry, whether it was a manufactured auto or just a dream in one's mind. One part of the book that I give a big thumbs up to is on the inside of the back jacket where Bill states that "historical accuracy and credence are paramount in the book" Bill 's effort is excellent because this is truly a first class book!

The book was published in 2007 and received the Thomas McKean Memorial Cup Award in 2008 from the Antique Automobile Club Association. This book is self-published meaning that Bill absorbed the cost of writing, research and production.

The book retails for \$39.95, but is available to Lincoln Highway Association members for a special price of \$32.99 postage paid.
